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**Details of Conditions:****1.0 - General Conditions of Consent**

The following conditions of consent are general conditions applying to the development.

- (1) **Engineering Specifications** - The entire development shall be designed and constructed in accordance with Council's Engineering Specifications and the relevant DCP.
- (2) **Waste Bin Collection Points** - A waste bin collection point that is clear from the positioning of driveways, tree plantings (or tree canopies), street lighting or other fixtures must be provided for each approved lot. This area is to be 3 metres long x 0.9 metres wide and provide a 3.9 metre clear vertical space to allow for the truck-lifting arm.
- (3) **Approved Plans and Documents** - Development shall be carried out in accordance with the following plans and documentation, and all recommendations made therein, except where amended by the conditions of this development consent:

- (4) **Acoustic Report** - An acoustic report will be required for proposed lot 511 with any further application for a dwelling to be constructed on site.
- (5) **Road and Maritime Services** - Roads and Maritime have no other approved proposal that requires any part of the subject property for road purposes. Therefore all buildings and structures together with any improvements integral to the future use of the site are to be wholly within the freehold property unlimited in height or depth along the Alamein Road Boundary.

**2.0 – Prior to Issue of a Construction Certificate**

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of a Construction Certificate.

- (1) **Civil Engineering Plans** - Civil engineering plans indicating drainage, roads, accessways, earthworks, pavement design, details of line-marking, traffic management, water quality and quantity facilities including stormwater detention and disposal, shall be prepared in accordance with the approved plans and Council's Engineering Design and Construction Specifications. Details demonstrating

compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.

**Note.** Under the *Roads Act 1993*, only the Council can approve commencement of works within an existing road reserve.

- (2) **Dilapidation Report – Council Property** - A Dilapidation Report prepared by a suitably qualified person, including a photographic survey of existing public roads, kerbs, footpaths, drainage structures, street trees and any other existing public infrastructure within the immediate area of the subject site. Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority prior to issue of a Construction Certificate.
- (3) **Soil, Erosion, Sediment and Water Management** - An Erosion and Sediment Control Plan (ESCP) shall be prepared in accordance with Council's Engineering Specifications. Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.

### 3.0 - Prior to Commencement of Works

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to any works commencing on the development site.

- (1) **Public Liability Insurance** - The owner or contractor shall take out a Public Liability Insurance Policy with a minimum cover of \$20 million in relation to the occupation of, and works within, public property (i.e. kerbs, gutters, footpaths, walkways, reserves, etc) for the full duration of the proposed works. Evidence of this Policy shall be provided to Council and the Certifying Authority.
- (2) **Notice of PCA Appointment** - Notice shall be given to Council at least two (2) days prior to subdivision and/or building works commencing in accordance with Clause 103 of the EP&A Regulation 2000. The notice shall include:
  - a) a description of the work to be carried out;
  - b) the address of the land on which the work is to be carried out;
  - c) the registered number and date of issue of the relevant development consent;
  - d) the name and address of the PCA, and of the person by whom the PCA was appointed;
  - e) if the PCA is an accredited certifier, his, her or its accreditation number, and a statement signed by the accredited certifier consenting to being appointed as PCA; and
  - f) a telephone number on which the PCA may be contacted for business purposes
- (3) **Notice Commencement of Work** - Notice shall be given to Council at least two (2) days prior to subdivision and/or building works commencing in accordance with Clause 104 of the EP&A Regulation 2000. The notice shall include:
  - a) the name and address of the person by whom the notice is being given;

- b) a description of the work to be carried out;
  - c) the address of the land on which the work is to be carried out;
  - d) the registered number and date of issue of the relevant development consent and construction certificate;
  - e) a statement signed by or on behalf of the PCA to the effect that all conditions of the consent that are required to be satisfied prior to the work commencing have been satisfied; and
  - f) the date on which the work is intended to commence.
- (4) **Construction Certificate Required** - In accordance with the provisions of Section 81A of the *EP&A Act 1979*, construction or subdivision works approved by this consent shall not commence until the following has been satisfied:
- a) a Construction Certificate has been issued by a Consent Authority;
  - b) a Principal Certifying Authority (PCA) has been appointed by the person having benefit of the development consent in accordance with Section 109E of the *EP&A Act 1979*;
  - c) if Council is not the PCA, Council is notified of the appointed PCA at least two (2) days before building work commences;
  - d) the person having benefit of the development consent notifies Council of the intention to commence building work at least two (2) days before building work commences; and
- the PCA is notified in writing of the name and contractor licence number of the owner/builder intending to carry out the approved works.
- (5) **Sign of PCA and Contact Details** - A sign shall be erected in a prominent position on the site stating the following:
- a) that unauthorised entry to the work site is prohibited;
  - b) the name of the principal contractor (or person in charge of the site) and a telephone number on which that person can be contacted at any time for business purposes and outside working hours; and
  - c) the name, address and telephone number of the PCA.
- The sign shall be maintained while the work is being carried out, and shall be removed upon the completion of works.
- (6) **Performance Bond** - Prior to commencement of works a performance bond of 10% must be lodged with Camden Council in accordance with Camden Council's Engineering Construction Specifications.
- (7) **Soil Erosion and Sediment Control** - Soil erosion and sediment controls must be implemented prior to works commencing on the site in accordance with 'Managing Urban Stormwater – Soils and Construction (the blue book)' and any Sediment and Erosion plans approved with this Development Consent.

Soil erosion and sediment control measures shall be maintained during construction works and shall only be removed upon completion of the project when all landscaping and disturbed surfaces have been stabilised (for example, with site turfing, paving or re-vegetation).

- (8) **Hazardous Building Materials Assessment** - A Hazardous Building Material Assessment (HBMA) shall be undertaken on all buildings and structures to be demolished that identifies all hazardous components on site. A HBMA report shall be provided to the PCA and Council.

Once hazardous components are identified, all demolition works that involve the demolition and removal of the hazardous materials shall ensure that all site personnel are protected from risk of exposure in accordance with relevant NSW WorkCover Authority and NSW Demolition Guidelines. Premises and occupants on adjoining land shall also be protected from exposure to any hazardous materials.

- (9) **Demolition Work** - Consent is granted for the demolition of the dwelling currently existing on the property, subject to compliance with the following conditions:
- a) The developer shall notify adjoining residents of demolition works seven (7) working days prior to demolition. Such notification is to be clearly written on A4 size paper giving the date demolition will commence and be placed in the letterbox of every premises (including every residential flat or unit, if any) either side, immediately at the rear of, and directly opposite, the demolition site;
  - b) Written notice shall be given to the PCA for inspection prior to demolition. Such written notice is to include the date when demolition will commence and details of the name, address, business hours and contact telephone number and licence number of the demolisher. The following inspection shall be undertaken by the PCA:
    - i) a pre-commencement inspection when all the site works are installed on the site and prior to demolition commencing; and
    - ii) a final inspection when the demolition works have been completed.
  - c) Prior to demolition, the applicant shall erect a sign at the front of the property with the demolisher's name, licence number, contact phone number and site address;
  - d) Prior to demolition, the applicant shall erect a 1.8m high temporary fence and hoarding between the work site and any public property (footpaths, roads, reserves etc). Access to the site shall be restricted to authorised persons only and the site shall be secured against unauthorised entry when work is not in progress or when the site is otherwise unoccupied;
  - e) Suitable erosion and sediment control measures in accordance with an approved ESCP shall be installed prior to the commencement of demolition works and shall be maintained at all times;
  - f) A Work Plan prepared by a suitably qualified person in accordance with AS 2601 'Demolition of Structures' shall be provided to the PCA for approval prior to demolition works commencing. The Work Plan shall identify hazardous

materials including surfaces coated with lead paint, method of demolition, the precautions to be employed to minimise any dust nuisance and the disposal methods for hazardous materials;

- g) If the property was built prior to 1987, an asbestos survey shall be carried out by a suitably qualified person prior to demolition. If asbestos is found, a WorkCover Authority licensed contractor shall remove all asbestos in accordance with the requirements of the WorkCover Authority, including notification of adjoining neighbours of asbestos removal;
- h) The burning of any demolished material on site is not permitted and offenders will be prosecuted; and
- i) Care shall be taken during demolition to ensure that existing services on the site (i.e. sewer, electricity, gas, phone, etc) are not damaged. Any damage caused to existing services is to be repaired by the relevant authority at the expense of the applicant.

#### 4.0 - During Works

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with during the construction phase of the development.

- (1) **Additional Approvals Required** - Where any works are proposed in the public road reservation, the following applications shall be made to Council, as applicable:
  - a) For installation or replacement of private stormwater drainage lines or utility services, including water supply, sewerage, gas, electricity, etc, an application shall be made for a Road Opening Permit and an approval under Section 45 of the *Roads Act 1993*;
  - b) For construction / reconstruction of Council infrastructure, including vehicular crossings, footpath, kerb and gutter, stormwater drainage, an application shall be made for a Roadworks Permit under Section 138B of the *Roads Act 1993*.

**Note:** Private stormwater drainage is the pipeline(s) that provide the direct connection between the development site and Council's stormwater drainage system, or street kerb and gutter.
- (2) **Construction Hours** - All work (including delivery of materials) shall be restricted to the hours of 7.00am to 5.00pm Monday to Saturday inclusive. Work is not to be carried out on Sundays or Public Holidays.
- (3) **Soil, Erosion, Sediment and Water Management – Implementation** - All requirements of the Erosion and Sediment Control Plan or Soil and Water Management Plan shall be maintained at all times during the works and any measures required by the plan shall not be removed until the site has been stabilised.
- (4) **Removal of Waste Materials** - Where there is a need to remove any identified materials from the site that contain fill/rubbish/asbestos, the waste material shall be assessed and classified in accordance with the NSW EPA Waste Classification Guidelines (2008) (refer to: [www.environment.nsw.gov.au/waste/envguidlins/index.htm](http://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/waste/envguidlins/index.htm))  
Once assessed, the materials shall be disposed to a licensed waste facility suitable for that particular classification of waste. Copies of tipping dockets shall be retained and supplied to Council upon request.



- (5) **Waste Disposal** - The building owner shall ensure that there is a contract with a licensed contractor for the removal of all waste. No garbage is to be placed on the public way (e.g. footpaths, roadways, plazas, reserves) at any time.
- (6) **Movement of Bins** - The space between the bin collection point and bin storage area for bin transportation must be free from obstructions, steps or steep gradients and must provide a hard surface for easy transportation of bins.
- (7) **Compliance with BCA** - All building work shall be carried out in accordance with the requirements of the BCA.
- (8) **Noise** - All work shall not give rise to an 'offensive noise' as defined in the *Protection of the Environment Operations Act (1997)*.  
  
All work shall comply with the requirement of the NSW Industrial Noise Policy and the Environment Protection Authority Environmental Noise Manual.
- (9) **Offensive Noise, Dust, Odour and Vibration** - All work shall not give rise to offensive noise, dust, odour or vibration as defined in the *Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997* when measured at the property boundary.

#### 7.0 - Prior to Issue of a Subdivision Certificate

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of a Subdivision Certificate.

- (1) **Requirement for a Subdivision Certificate** - The application for subdivision certificate(s) shall be made in accordance with the requirements of Clause 157 of the Environmental Planning & Assessment Regulation 2000.
- (2) **Show Easements/ Restrictions On The Plan Of Subdivision** - The developer shall acknowledge all existing easements and/or restrictions on the use of the land on the final plan of subdivision.
- (3) **Burdened Lots To Be Identified** - Any lots subsequently identified during construction of the subdivision as requiring restrictions shall also be suitably burdened.
- (4) **Subdivision Certificate** - The issue of a Subdivision Certificate is not to occur until all conditions of this development consent have been satisfactorily addressed and all engineering works are complete, unless otherwise approved in writing by the PCA.
- (5) **Incomplete Works** - Prior to the issue of the Subdivision Certificate the applicant is to lodge a bond with Camden Council for the construction of incomplete works, including concrete footpath and/or pedestrian/cycle shared way, in accordance with Camden Council's current Engineering Construction Specifications.
- (6) **Surveyor's Report** - Prior to the issue of the Subdivision Certificate a certificate from a registered surveyor must be provided to the PCA, certifying that all drainage lines have been laid within their proposed easements. Certification is also to be provided stating that no services or accessways encroach over the proposed boundary other than as provided for by easements as created by the final plan of subdivision.

- (7) **Soil Classification** - A Soil Classification Report prepared by a suitable qualified person in accordance with the AS 2870 'Residential Slabs and Footings', detailing the general classification of soil type generally found within the subdivision, shall be provided to the PCA. A classification shall be provided for each lot within the subdivision. The Soil Classification Report shall also be provided to Council.
- (8) **Services** - Certificates and/or relevant documents shall be obtained from the following service providers and provided to the PCA:
- a) Energy supplier – Evidence demonstrating that satisfactory arrangements have been made with the energy supplier to service the proposed development;
  - b) Telecommunications – Evidence demonstrating that satisfactory arrangements have been made with a telecommunications carrier to service the proposed development; and,
  - c) Water supplier – Evidence demonstrating that satisfactory arrangements have been made with a water supply provider to service the proposed development.
- (9) **Works As Executed Plan** - Works As Executed Plans shall be prepared and provided in accordance with Council's Engineering Specifications.
- Digital data must be in AutoCAD .dwg or .dxf format, and the data projection coordinate must be in (GDA94.MGA zone 56).
- (10) **Section 88B Instrument** - The applicant shall prepare a Section 88B Instrument for approval by the PCA which incorporates the following easements, positive covenants and restrictions to user where necessary:
- a) easement for services;
  - b) easement to drain water and drainage easement/s over overland flow paths; and,
  - c) An acoustic report will be required for proposed lot 511 with any further application for a dwelling to be constructed on site. The Terms of Restriction fourthly referred in DP 807263, which refers to the acoustic barrier, shall not be included in this Section 88B Instrument.
- (11) **Defects and Liability Bond** - The applicant is to lodge a defects and liability bond in the form of an unconditional bank guarantee or cash bond, being 10% of the value of civil works, with Council.
- The bond covers any defects and liabilities of the public infrastructure.
- (12) **Section 94 Contributions** - Pursuant to Camden Contributions Plan 2011 adopted in April 2012, a contribution must be paid to Council of \$10,282 per additional lot or dwelling, for **Recreation & Community Facilities, Volunteer Emergency Services Facilities and Plan Preparation & Administration Services**.
- The contribution must be indexed by the methods set out in Paragraph 2.15.1 of the plan and paid Prior to the issue of a Subdivision Certificate.

- (13) **Section 94 Contributions** - Pursuant to Camden Contributions Plan 2011 adopted in April 2012, a contribution must be paid to Council of \$8,248 per additional lot or dwelling, for **Open Space, Recreation & Community Land**.

The contribution must be indexed by the methods set out in Paragraph 2.15.2 of the plan and paid Prior to the issue of a Subdivision Certificate.

**Reasons for Conditions:**

- (1) To ensure that the development complies with statutory requirements including the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*, the *Environments Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000*, the *Building Code of Australia* and applicable Australian Standards.
- (2) To ensure that the development meets the aims, objectives and requirements of the environmental planning instruments, development controls plans, Council policies and Section 94 contribution plans that apply to the site and development.
- (3) To ensure that the development complies with the submitted plans and supporting documentation.
- (4) To ensure that the development will be constructed/operated in a manner that will minimise impacts upon the environment.

**Advisory Conditions:**

- (1) An acoustic report will be required for proposed lot 511 with any further application for a dwelling to be constructed on site.

**Responsibility for Other Approvals / Agreements**

The applicant is solely responsible for ensuring that all additional consents and agreements are obtained from other authorities, as relevant.

**Appeals**

The applicant has the right to appeal to the Land and Environment Court under Section 97 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979*. The right to appeal is only valid for a development application within 6 months after the date on which the applicant received this notice.

**Appeals – Third Party**

A third party right to appeal to this development consent is available under Section 123, subject to Section 101, of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979*.

**Determination Review**

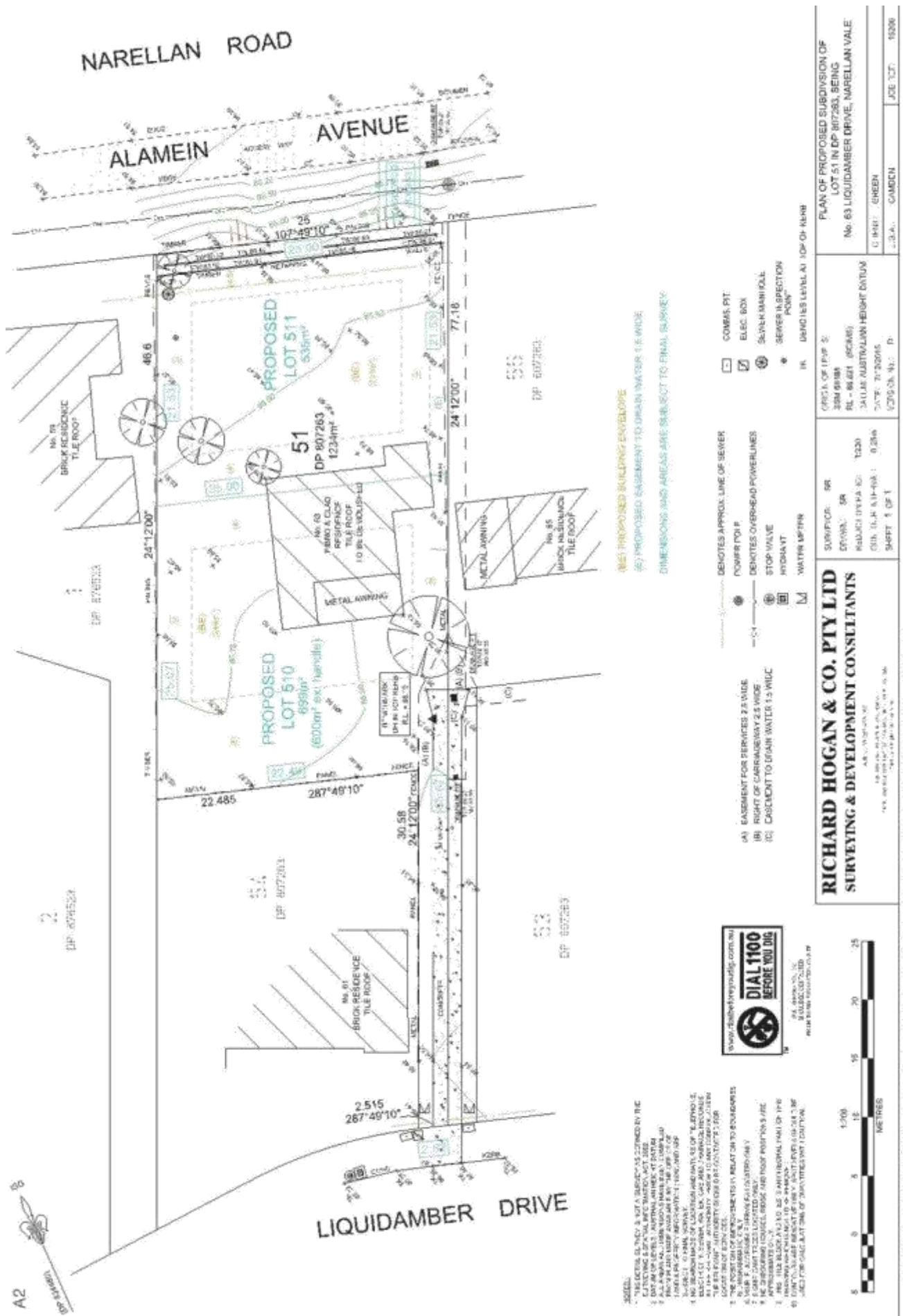
If you are an applicant and you are dissatisfied with the determination, you may within 6 months from the date of determination, request Council, in writing, to review the determination.

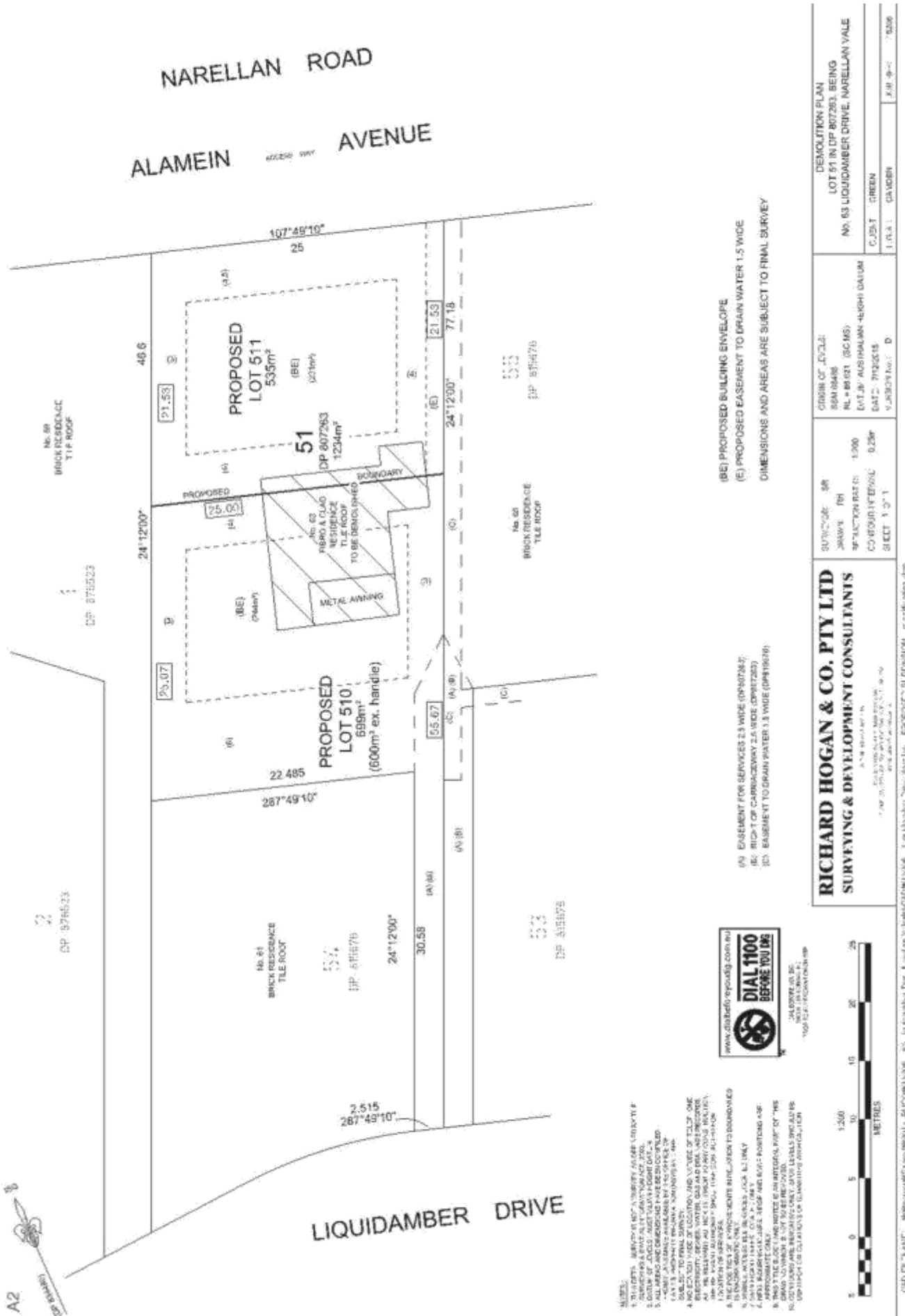


Any advice or notice to the consent authority shall be served on the General Manager of Camden Council.

- (2) **BASIX Certificate** - The applicant shall undertake the development strictly in accordance with the commitments listed in the approved BASIX certificate(s) for the development to which this consent applies.
- (3) **Building Code of Australia** - All building work shall be carried out in accordance with the BCA. In this clause, a reference to the BCA is a reference to that Code as in force on the date the application for the relevant Construction Certificate is made.
- (4) **Home Building Act** - Pursuant to Section 80A(11) of the *EP&A Act 1979*, residential building work within the meaning of the *Home Building Act 1989* shall not be carried out unless the PCA for the development to which the work relates:
  - a) in the case of work for which a principal contractor has been appointed:
    - i. has been informed in writing of the name and licence number of the principal contractor; and





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- ii. where required has provided an insurance certificate with the name of the insurer by which the work is insured under Part 6 of that Act.
  - b) in the case of work to be carried out by an owner-builder;
    - i. has been informed in writing of the name of the owner-builder; and
    - ii. If the owner-builder is required to hold an owner-builder permit under that Act; has provided a copy of the owner builder permit.
- (5) **Excavation for Residential Building Works** - If the approved development involves an excavation that extends below the level of the base of the footings of a building on adjoining land, the person having the benefit of the consent shall, at the person's own expense:
- a) protect and support the adjoining premises from possible damage from the excavation; and
  - b) where necessary, underpin the adjoining premises to prevent any such damage.
- This condition does not apply if the person having the benefit of the consent owns the adjoining land or the owner of the adjoining land has given consent in writing to that condition not applying, and a copy of that written consent is provided to the PCA prior to the excavation commencing.
- (6) **Swimming Pools and Spas** - The swimming pool/spa shall comply with:
- a) the *Swimming Pools Act 1992*;
  - b) the *Swimming Pools Regulation 2008*;
  - c) AS 1926.1-2012 'Swimming Pool Safety' Part 1: Safety barriers for swimming pools;
  - d) AS 3500.2-2003 'Plumbing and drainage – Sanitary plumbing and drainage';
  - e) AS1926.3 'Water recirculation systems'; and
  - f) the BCA 2014.
- (7) **Front Fence Height** – The front fence height is to be no higher than 1m above the finished street level in accordance with the Oran Park Precinct Development Control Plan 2007.
- (8) **Side and Rear Boundary Fences** – The side and rear boundary fences must be no higher than 1.8m in accordance with the Oran Park Precinct Development Control Plan 2007.
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- (9) **Screening Devices** – 1.8m high fixed permanent screening devices must be installed along the northern portion of the alfresco area and sides of the upper floor balcony as shown on the approved plans.
  - (10) **Internal Doors within the Garage** – The internal door numbered D17 is to be made a sliding door and D18 is to swing into the home office to preserve the integrity of the vehicle accommodation.

## 2.0 – Prior to Issue of a Construction Certificate

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of a Construction Certificate.

- (1) **Structural Engineer's Details** - The piers/slabs/footings/structural elements shall be designed and certified by a suitably qualified structural engineer and shall take into consideration the recommendations of any Geotechnical Report applicable to the site. A statement to that effect shall be provided to the Certifying Authority.
- (2) **Building Platform** - This consent restricts excavation or fill for the purposes of creating a building platform. The building platform shall not exceed 2.0m from the external walls of the building. Where the external walls are within 2.0m of any property boundary, no parallel fill is permitted and a deepened edge beam to natural ground level shall be used. Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.
- (3) **Driveway Gradients and Design** - For all driveways that relate to development for the purposes of a dwelling house, the driveway gradient and design shall comply with AS 2890.1-2004 'Off street car parking' and:
  - a) the driveway shall comply with Council's Engineering Specifications;
  - b) the driveway shall be at least 1m from any street tree, stormwater pit or service infrastructure;
  - c) the level for the driveway across the footpath area shall achieve a gradient of 4%; and
  - d) a Public Road Activity approval must be obtained prior to the commencement of any works.

Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority prior to issue of a Construction Certificate.

- (4) **Salinity (Dwellings & Outbuildings)** - The proposed dwelling, landscaping and associated works for the development shall comply with the requirements of the Salinity Management Plan under 'Section 9' in the report titled 'Report on Salinity Investigation and Management Plan: Proposed Residential Subdivision Tranche 4 North Oran Park', prepared by Douglas Partners, Project 34272.06 dated May 2013.
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Alternatively, a site specific analysis including recommendations, prepared by a suitably qualified consultant and referencing Australian Standard AS2870-2011 and Council's Building in a Saline Prone Environment Policy shall be submitted to the Certifying Authority.

Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.

- (5) **Long Service Levy** - In accordance with Section 34 of the *Building and Construction Industry Long Service Payments Act 1986*, the applicant shall pay a long service levy at the prescribed rate to either the Long Service Payments Corporation or Council for any work that cost \$25,000 or more.
- (6) **Surface Water Collection from Swimming Pools and Spas** - Swimming pool surrounds and/or paving shall be constructed so as to ensure water from the pool overflow or surge does not discharge onto neighbouring properties. Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority.

### 3.0 - Prior to Commencement of Works

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to any works commencing on the development site.

- (1) **Notice of PCA Appointment** - Notice shall be given to Council at least two (2) days prior to subdivision and/or building works commencing in accordance with Clause 103 of the EP&A Regulation 2000. The notice shall include:
    - a) a description of the work to be carried out;
    - b) the address of the land on which the work is to be carried out;
    - c) the registered number and date of issue of the relevant development consent;
    - d) the name and address of the PCA, and of the person by whom the PCA was appointed;
    - e) if the PCA is an accredited certifier, his, her or its accreditation number, and a statement signed by the accredited certifier consenting to being appointed as PCA; and
    - f) a telephone number on which the PCA may be contacted for business purposes.
  - (2) **Notice Commencement of Work** - Notice shall be given to Council at least two (2) days prior to subdivision and/or building works commencing in accordance with Clause 104 of the EP&A Regulation 2000. The notice shall include:
    - a) the name and address of the person by whom the notice is being given;
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- b) a description of the work to be carried out;
  - c) the address of the land on which the work is to be carried out;
  - d) the registered number and date of issue of the relevant development consent and construction certificate;
  - e) a statement signed by or on behalf of the PCA to the effect that all conditions of the consent that are required to be satisfied prior to the work commencing have been satisfied; and
  - f) the date on which the work is intended to commence.
- (3) **Construction Certificate Required** - In accordance with the provisions of Section 81A of the *EP&A Act 1979*, construction or subdivision works approved by this consent shall not commence until the following has been satisfied:
- a) a Construction Certificate has been issued by a Consent Authority;
  - b) a Principal Certifying Authority (PCA) has been appointed by the person having benefit of the development consent in accordance with Section 109E of the *EP&A Act 1979*;
  - c) if Council is not the PCA, Council is notified of the appointed PCA at least two (2) days before building work commences;
  - d) the person having benefit of the development consent notifies Council of the intention to commence building work at least two (2) days before building work commences; and
- the PCA is notified in writing of the name and contractor licence number of the owner/builder intending to carry out the approved works.
- (4) **Sign of PCA and Contact Details** - A sign shall be erected in a prominent position on the site stating the following:
- a) that unauthorised entry to the work site is prohibited;
  - b) the name of the principal contractor (or person in charge of the site) and a telephone number on which that person can be contacted at any time for business purposes and outside working hours; and
  - c) the name, address and telephone number of the PCA.
- The sign shall be maintained while the work is being carried out, and shall be removed upon the completion of works.
- (5) **Sydney Water Approval** - The approved development plans shall be approved by Sydney Water.
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- (6) **Soil Erosion and Sediment Control** - Soil erosion and sediment controls must be implemented prior to works commencing on the site in accordance with 'Managing Urban Stormwater – Soils and Construction ('the blue book') and any Sediment and Erosion plans approved with this Development Consent.

Soil erosion and sediment control measures shall be maintained during construction works and shall only be removed upon completion of the project when all landscaping and disturbed surfaces have been stabilised (for example, with site turfing, paving or re-vegetation).

#### 4.0 - During Works

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with during the construction phase of the development.

- (1) **Construction Hours** - All work (including delivery of materials) shall be restricted to the hours of 7.00am to 5.00pm Monday to Saturday inclusive. Work is not to be carried out on Sundays or Public Holidays.
- (2) **Compliance with BCA** - All building work shall be carried out in accordance with the requirements of the BCA.
- (3) **Retaining Walls** - The following restrictions apply to any retaining wall erected within the allotment boundaries:
- a) retaining walls shall be constructed a minimum of 300mm from any property boundary to ensure all associated drainage and backfill remain wholly within the subject property;
  - b) adequate provisions shall be made for surface and subsurface drainage of retaining walls and all water collected shall be diverted to, and connected to, a stormwater disposal system within the property boundaries;
  - c) retaining walls shall not be erected within drainage easements; and
  - d) retaining walls shall not be erected in any other easement present on the land without the approval of the relevant authority benefited.
- (4) **Stormwater – Collection and Discharge Requirements** - The roof of the subject building(s) shall be provided with guttering and down pipes and all drainage lines, including stormwater drainage lines from other areas and overflows from rainwater tanks, conveyed to the (select option a, b or c):
- a) street gutter;
  - b) drainage easement; or
  - c) existing drainage system.
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Connection to the drainage easement or kerb shall only occur at the designated connection point for the allotment. New connections that require the rectification of an easement pipe or kerb shall only occur with the prior approval of Camden Council.

All roofwater shall be connected to the approved roofwater disposal system immediately after the roofing material has been fixed to the framing members. The PCA shall not permit construction works beyond the frame inspection stage until this work has been carried out.

- (5) **Works by Owner** - Where a portion of the building works do not form part of a building contract with the principal contractor (builder) and are required to be completed by the owner, such works shall be scheduled by the owner so that all works coincide with the completion of the main building being erected by the principal contractor.
  - (6) **Survey Report** - The building shall be set out by a registered land surveyor. A peg out survey detailing the siting of the building in accordance with the approved plans shall be provided to the PCA prior to the pouring of concrete.
  - (7) **Easements** - No changes to site levels, or any form of construction shall occur within any easements that may be located on the allotment.
  - (8) **Swimming Pool Fence Design** - The swimming pool or spa must be fenced so that the pool is effectively isolated from the dwelling and adjoining lands. The swimming pool fence must comply with the following requirements:
    - a) The swimming pool safety fencing must strictly adhere to the design and location approved with the development consent, and any conditions of the development consent;
    - b) Fences and gates must strictly comply with AS 1926-2012 – Swimming pool safety – Part 1: Safety barriers for swimming pools;
    - c) Fencing shall have a minimum effective height of 1.2m;
    - d) All swimming pool gates shall be self-closing and self-latching. All gates must open outwards from the swimming pool enclosure;
    - e) The filtration equipment including any cover, housing or pipe work, must not be located within a distance of 900mm from the outside face of the swimming pool safety fencing enclosure, nor within 300mm from the inside of the swimming pool safety fencing enclosure (where footholds are possible); and
    - f) Boundary fencing forming part of the swimming pool safety fencing shall maintain a minimum effective height of 1.8m and a 0.9m non climbable zone (measured from the top of the inside of the barrier).
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The swimming pool safety fencing must be installed prior to the swimming pool being filled with water. The Principal Certifying Authority (PCA), or an accredited certifier must inspect the swimming pool safety fencing.

- (9) **Waste Water from Swimming Pools and Spas** - All swimming pool waste water shall be disposed of as follows:

- a) Where a Sydney Water sewer is available – waste water shall be drained or pumped to the sewer; and
- b) Where a Sydney Water sewer is not available (such as rural areas) – waste water shall be disposed of as follows:

Chlorinated pool waste water:

- i) Discharging to a rubble pit measured 600mm wide x 600mm deep x 3m long, located not less than 3m from any structure or property boundary; or
- ii) Discharging to a tall out drain to disperse the water over a large grassed area or paddock, provided that the land fall does not direct water to buildings on the subject or adjoining properties, or create a nuisance to an adjoining property owner.

Saltwater pool waste water:

- iii) Discharging as per point (ii) above.

All pool types:

- iv) Shall not be discharged to a septic tank or an on-site sewage management installation or disposal area; and
- v) Shall not be discharged into a reserve, watercourse, easement or storm water drainage system.

- (10) **Building Platform** - This approval restricts excavation or fill for the purposes of creating a building platform for the swimming pool. This area should not exceed 2 metres from the footprint of the swimming pool. Furthermore, any excavation or fill must not exceed 500mm in height and be placed closer than 500mm to the boundary, unless otherwise specifically approved by Council.

#### 5.0 - Prior to Issue of an Occupation Certificate

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of an Occupation Certificate.

- (1) **Occupation Certificate Required**- An Occupation Certificate shall be obtained prior to any use or occupation of the development.
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- (2) **Survey Certificate** - A registered surveyor shall prepare a Survey Certificate to certify that the location of the building in relation to the allotment boundaries complies with the approved plans or as specified by this consent. The Survey Certificate shall be provided to the satisfaction of the PCA.
- (3) **Footpath Crossing Construction** - A footpath crossing and driveway shall be constructed in accordance with this consent and the approved Construction Certificate prior to use or occupation of the development.
- (4) **Waste Management Plan** - The PCA shall ensure that all works have been completed in accordance with the approved waste management plan referred to in this development consent.
- (5) **Filter & Recirculation Systems** - Prior to issue of an Occupation Certificate, a certificate of compliance, or other documentary evidence confirming that the proposed recirculation system and filtration system complies with AS1926.3, must be provided to the PCA.
- (6) **Swimming Pool Register** - In accordance with Part 3A of the *Swimming Pools Act 1992* all swimming pools (including spas) are required to be registered on the NSW Swimming Pools Register. You can register your Swimming Pool online at [www.swimmingpoolregister.nsw.gov.au](http://www.swimmingpoolregister.nsw.gov.au)
- Prior to the issue of any occupation certificate you are required to provide evidence in the form of the Certificate of Registration to the PCA.
- (7) **Warning Notice** - A warning notice complying with the provisions of Clause 10 of the *Swimming Pools Regulation 2008*, must be displayed and maintained in a prominent position in the immediate vicinity of the swimming pool, in accordance with Section 17 of the *Swimming Pools Act, 1992*.
- The PCA shall ensure that this warning notice is provided and displayed prior to the issue of the Occupation Certificate.
- Council also recommends that all owners and/or users of swimming pools obtain a copy of the 'Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Guideline' known as "Guideline 7: Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation" published in February 2010 by the Australian Resuscitation Council (available through [www.resus.org.au](http://www.resus.org.au)).
- (8) **Swimming Pool Landscaping** - Landscaping of the swimming pool enclosure and surrounds including the provision of outdoor furniture, construction of barbecues and pergolas must not reduce the effectiveness of the swimming pool safety fencing. All landscaping, furniture, and other similar structures shall be located at least 900mm from the outside of the pool safety fencing.

#### 6.0 – Ongoing Use

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The following conditions of consent are operational conditions applying to the development.

(1) **Residential Air Conditioning Units** - The operation of air conditioning units shall operate as follows:

- a) be inaudible in a habitable room during the hours of 10pm – 7am on weekdays and 10pm to 8am on weekends and public holidays; and
- b) emit a sound pressure level when measured at the boundary of any neighbouring residential property, at a time other than those specified in (a) above, which exceeds the background (LA90, 15 minutes) by more than 5dB(A). The source noise level shall be measured as a LAeq 15 minute.

(2) **Noise Nuisance Prevention** - The motor, filter, pump, and all sound producing equipment associated with or forming part of the swimming pool filtration system must be located so as not to cause a nuisance to adjoining property owners.

Should a noise nuisance arise, Council may serve Orders issued pursuant to the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979* requiring remedial works to be carried out. Action may also be initiated by the PCA where the PCA is not Council.

The location of equipment that causes offensive noise may require the equipment to be located within a suitable acoustic enclosure, or the relocation of such equipment.

(3) **Prohibitions Within Swimming Pool Enclosure** - The area contained within the swimming pool safety fencing enclosure must not be used for other non related activities or equipment, such as the installation of children's play equipment or clothes drying lines.

(4) **Swimming Pool Water Health Standards** - To maintain hygienic conditions, the swimming pool must be maintained in a clean and healthy condition at all times. For this purpose the following health standards must be maintained:

- a) Chlorination without Cyanurate Sun Stabiliser  
Free chlorine concentration must be maintained within the following range:
  - Outdoor swimming pools - not less than 1mg per litre;
  - Indoor swimming pools - water temperature 26 degrees C or below,  
not less than 1.5mg per litre;
  - water temperature above 26 degrees C not less than 2mg per litre;

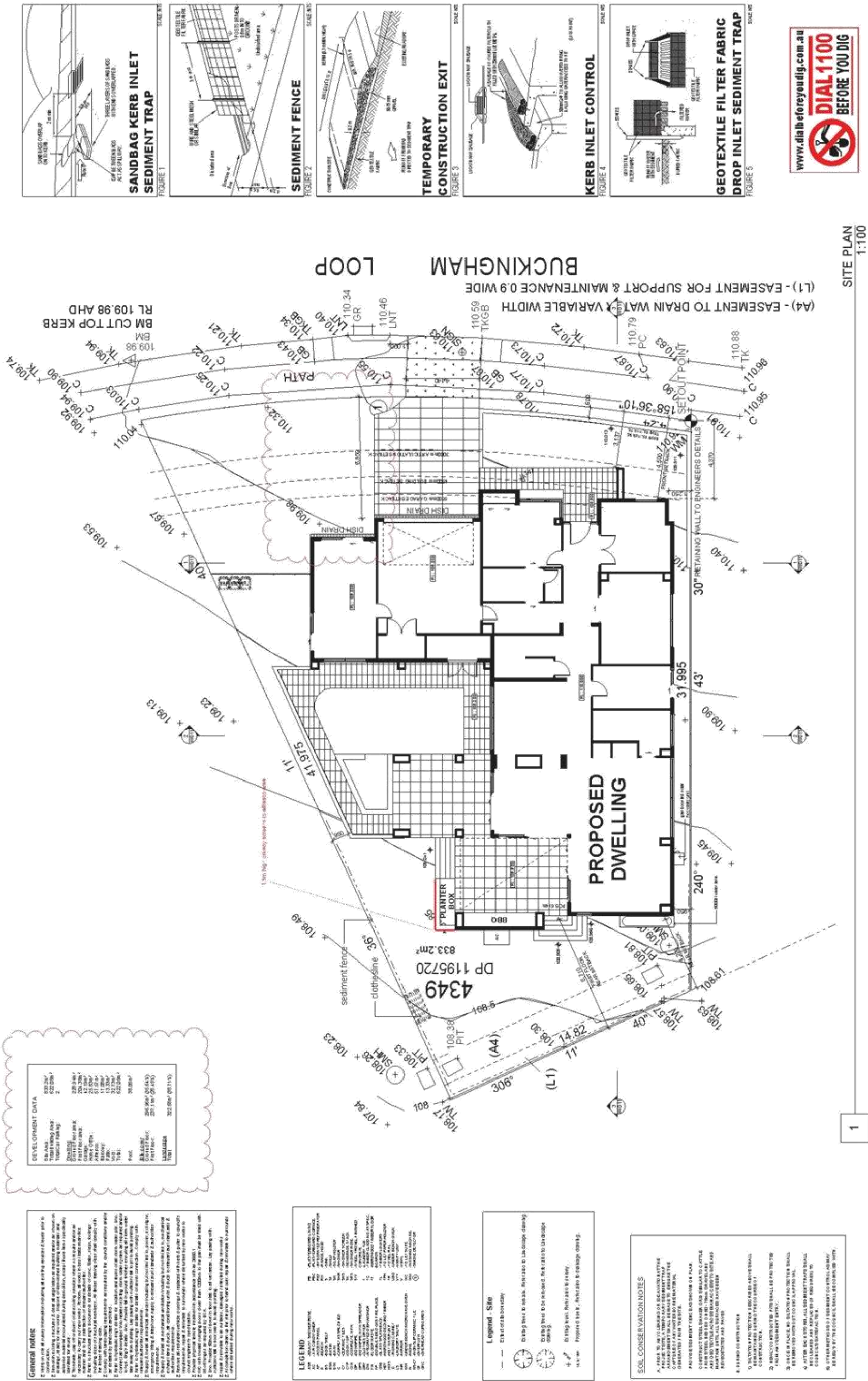
**Note:** Cyanurate compounds must not be used in the disinfecting of indoor swimming pools and spa water.

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- b) Chlorination with Cyanurate (Sun Stabiliser Added)  
Free residual chlorine concentration must be not less than 3mg per litre.  
The Cyanurate concentration must be maintained within the range 25 to 50mg per litre;
- c) pH must be maintained within the range of 7.5 and 8.1;
- d) Reserve Alkalinity  
Where sodium or calcium hypochloride is used, must be not less than 60mg per litre; and
- e) Sodium hypochloride – liquid chlorine  
Calcium hypochloride - granulated chlorine
- Note:** The above information is supplied by the NSW Department of Health.
- (5) **Home Office Use** – The home office shown on the approved ground floor plan is not to be converted to a garage.
- (6) **Privacy Screens** - Any privacy screen/s shall be permanently maintained in accordance with the approved plans for the life of the development.

- (2) **BASIX Certificate** - The applicant shall undertake the development strictly in accordance with the commitments listed in the approved BASIX certificate(s) for the development to which this consent applies.
- (3) **Building Code of Australia** - All building work shall be carried out in accordance with the BCA. In this clause, a reference to the BCA is a reference to that Code as in force on the date the application for the relevant Construction Certificate is made.
- (4) **Home Building Act** - Pursuant to Section 80A(11) of the *EP&A Act 1979*, residential building work within the meaning of the *Home Building Act 1989* shall not be carried out unless the PCA for the development to which the work relates:
- a) in the case of work for which a principal contractor has been appointed:
    - i. has been informed in writing of the name and licence number of the principal contractor; and
    - ii. where required has provided an insurance certificate with the name of the insurer by which the work is insured under Part 6 of that Act.
  - b) in the case of work to be carried out by an owner-builder;
    - i. has been informed in writing of the name of the owner-builder; and
    - ii. if the owner-builder is required to hold an owner-builder permit under that Act; has provided a copy of the owner builder permit.
- (5) **Excavation for Residential Building Works** - If the approved development involves an excavation that extends below the level of the base of the footings of a building on adjoining land, the person having the benefit of the consent shall, at the person's own expense:
- a) protect and support the adjoining premises from possible damage from the excavation; and
  - b) where necessary, underpin the adjoining premises to prevent any such damage.
- This condition does not apply if the person having the benefit of the consent owns the adjoining land or the owner of the adjoining land has given consent in writing to that condition not applying, and a copy of that written consent is provided to the PCA prior to the excavation commencing.
- (6) **Boundary Fencing** – The boundary fencing for Dwelling A is to be consistent with the approved site plan. This includes 1.8m height boundary fencing for one third of the length of the secondary street frontage consistent with the Oran Park



DCP clause 7.6.10 *Boundary Fencing* as specified for corner allotments. This fencing shall screen the open space area to the north-east of Dwelling A.

## 2.0 – Prior to Issue of a Construction Certificate

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of a Construction Certificate.

- (1) **Structural Engineer's Details** - The piers/slabs/footings/structural elements shall be designed and certified by a suitably qualified structural engineer and shall take into consideration the recommendations of any Geotechnical Report applicable to the site. A statement to that effect shall be provided to the Certifying Authority.
- (2) **Building Platform** - This consent restricts excavation or fill for the purposes of creating a building platform. The building platform shall not exceed 2.0m from the external walls of the building. Where the external walls are within 2.0m of any property boundary, no parallel fill is permitted and a deepened edge beam to natural ground level shall be used. Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.
- (3) **Driveway Gradients and Design** - For all driveways that relate to development for the purposes of a dwelling house, the driveway gradient and design shall comply with AS 2890.1-2004 'Off street car parking' and:
  - a) the driveway shall comply with Council's Engineering Specifications;
  - b) the driveway shall be at least 1m from any street tree, stormwater pit or service infrastructure;
  - c) the level for the driveway across the footpath area shall achieve a gradient of 4%; and
  - d) a Public Road Activity approval must be obtained prior to the commencement of any works.

Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority prior to issue of a Construction Certificate.

- (4) **Salinity (Dwellings & Outbuildings)** - The proposed dwelling, landscaping and associated works for the development shall comply with the requirements of the Salinity Management Plan proposed residential development "Salinity Investigation and Management Plan: Proposed Subdivision Tranches 4-6 Oran Park, Prepared by Douglas Partners, Project 34272.23, Dated December 2011.

Alternatively, a site specific analysis including recommendations, prepared by a suitably qualified consultant and referencing Australian Standard AS2870-2011 and Council's Building in a Saline Prone Environment Policy shall be submitted to the Certifying Authority.





Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.

- (5) **Long Service Levy** - In accordance with Section 34 of the *Building and Construction Industry Long Service Payments Act 1986*, the applicant shall pay a long service levy at the prescribed rate to either the Long Service Payments Corporation or Council for any work that cost \$25,000 or more.
- (6) **Section 94 Contributions – Monetary (Turner Road and Oran Park)** - A contribution pursuant to the provisions of Section 94 of the *EP&A Act 1979* for the services and amounts detailed below.

The amount of contribution payable under this condition has been calculated at the date of consent. In accordance with the provisions of the Contributions Plan, this amount shall be indexed at the time of actual payment in accordance with the applicable Index.

- (7) **Acoustic Report** – The development shall be constructed in accordance with the provisions contained within the "Oran Park Tranche 5 Stage 2A Road Traffic Noise Assessment Report, Prepared by Renzo Tonin & Associates Dated 11 December 2012.". Details demonstrating compliance shall be provided to the Certifying Authority with the Construction Certificate application.
- (8) **Special Infrastructure Contribution** - The applicant shall make a special infrastructure contribution (SIC) in accordance with the determination made by the Minister administering the *EP&A Act 1979* under Section 94EE of that Act and as in force on the date of this consent. This contribution shall be paid to the DP&E.

Evidence of payment of the SIC shall be provided to Council and the Certifying Authority.

### 3.0 - Prior to Commencement of Works

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to any works commencing on the development site.

- (1) **Notice of PCA Appointment** - Notice shall be given to Council at least two (2) days prior to subdivision and/or building works commencing in accordance with Clause 103 of the EP&A Regulation 2000. The notice shall include:
  - a) a description of the work to be carried out;
  - b) the address of the land on which the work is to be carried out;
  - c) the registered number and date of issue of the relevant development consent;
  - d) the name and address of the PCA, and of the person by whom the PCA was appointed;
  - e) if the PCA is an accredited certifier, his, her or its accreditation number, and a statement signed by the accredited certifier consenting to being appointed as PCA; and
  - f) a telephone number on which the PCA may be contacted for business purposes





- (2) **Notice Commencement of Work** - Notice shall be given to Council at least two (2) days prior to subdivision and/or building works commencing in accordance with Clause 104 of the EP&A Regulation 2000. The notice shall include:
- a) the name and address of the person by whom the notice is being given;
  - b) a description of the work to be carried out;
  - c) the address of the land on which the work is to be carried out;
  - d) the registered number and date of issue of the relevant development consent and construction certificate;
  - e) a statement signed by or on behalf of the PCA to the effect that all conditions of the consent that are required to be satisfied prior to the work commencing have been satisfied; and
  - f) the date on which the work is intended to commence.
- (3) **Construction Certificate Required** - In accordance with the provisions of Section 81A of the *EP&A Act 1979*, construction or subdivision works approved by this consent shall not commence until the following has been satisfied:
- a) a Construction Certificate has been issued by a Consent Authority;
  - b) a Principal Certifying Authority (PCA) has been appointed by the person having benefit of the development consent in accordance with Section 109E of the *EP&A Act 1979*;
  - c) if Council is not the PCA, Council is notified of the appointed PCA at least two (2) days before building work commences;
  - d) the person having benefit of the development consent notifies Council of the intention to commence building work at least two (2) days before building work commences; and
- the PCA is notified in writing of the name and contractor licence number of the owner/builder intending to carry out the approved works.
- (4) **Sign of PCA and Contact Details** - A sign shall be erected in a prominent position on the site stating the following:
- a) that unauthorised entry to the work site is prohibited;
  - b) the name of the principal contractor (or person in charge of the site) and a telephone number on which that person can be contacted at any time for business purposes and outside working hours; and
  - c) the name, address and telephone number of the PCA.



The sign shall be maintained while the work is being carried out, and shall be removed upon the completion of works.

- (5) **Sydney Water Approval** - The approved development plans shall be approved by Sydney Water.
- (6) **Soil Erosion and Sediment Control** - Soil erosion and sediment controls must be implemented prior to works commencing on the site in accordance with 'Managing Urban Stormwater – Soils and Construction ('the blue book') and any Sediment and Erosion plans approved with this Development Consent.

Soil erosion and sediment control measures shall be maintained during construction works and shall only be removed upon completion of the project when all landscaping and disturbed surfaces have been stabilised (for example, with site turfing, paving or re-vegetation).

#### 4.0 - During Works

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with during the construction phase of the development.

- (1) **Construction Hours** - All work (including delivery of materials) shall be restricted to the hours of 7.00am to 5.00pm Monday to Saturday inclusive. Work is not to be carried out on Sundays or Public Holidays.
- (2) **Compliance with BCA** - All building work shall be carried out in accordance with the requirements of the BCA.
- (3) **Retaining Walls** - The following restrictions apply to any retaining wall erected within the allotment boundaries:
  - a) retaining walls shall be constructed a minimum of 300mm from any property boundary to ensure all associated drainage and backfill remain wholly within the subject property;
  - b) adequate provisions shall be made for surface and subsurface drainage of retaining walls and all water collected shall be diverted to, and connected to, a stormwater disposal system within the property boundaries;
  - c) retaining walls shall not be erected within drainage easements; and
  - d) retaining walls shall not be erected in any other easement present on the land without the approval of the relevant authority benefited.
- (4) **Stormwater – Collection and Discharge Requirements** - The roof of the subject building(s) shall be provided with guttering and down pipes and all drainage lines, including stormwater drainage lines from other areas and overflows from rainwater tanks, conveyed to the (select option a, b or c):



- a) street gutter;
- b) drainage easement; or
- c) existing drainage system.

Connection to the drainage easement or kerb shall only occur at the designated connection point for the allotment. New connections that require the rectification of an easement pipe or kerb shall only occur with the prior approval of Camden Council.

All roofwater shall be connected to the approved roofwater disposal system immediately after the roofing material has been fixed to the framing members. The PCA shall not permit construction works beyond the frame inspection stage until this work has been carried out.

- (5) **Works by Owner** - Where a portion of the building works do not form part of a building contract with the principal contractor (builder) and are required to be completed by the owner, such works shall be scheduled by the owner so that all works coincide with the completion of the main building being erected by the principal contractor.
- (6) **Survey Report** - The building shall be set out by a registered land surveyor. A peg out survey detailing the siting of the building in accordance with the approved plans shall be provided to the PCA prior to the pouring of concrete.
- (7) **Easements** - No changes to site levels, or any form of construction shall occur within any easements that may be located on the allotment.

#### 5.0 - Prior to Issue of an Occupation Certificate

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of an Occupation Certificate.

- (1) **Occupation Certificate Required**- An Occupation Certificate shall be obtained prior to any use or occupation of the development.
- (2) **Survey Certificate** - A registered surveyor shall prepare a Survey Certificate to certify that the location of the building in relation to the allotment boundaries complies with the approved plans or as specified by this consent. The Survey Certificate shall be provided to the satisfaction of the PCA.
- (3) **Footpath Crossing Construction** - A footpath crossing and driveway shall be constructed in accordance with this consent and the approved Construction Certificate prior to use or occupation of the development.





- (4) **Waste Management Plan** - The PCA shall ensure that all works have been completed in accordance with the approved waste management plan referred to in this development consent.

## 6.0 – Ongoing Use

The following conditions of consent are operational conditions applying to the development.

- (1) **Residential Air Conditioning Units** - The operation of air conditioning units shall operate as follows:
- a) be inaudible in a habitable room during the hours of 10pm – 7am on weekdays and 10pm to 8am on weekends and public holidays;
  - b) emit a sound pressure level when measured at the boundary of any neighbouring residential property, at a time other than those specified in (a) above, which exceeds the background (LA90, 15 minutes) by more than 5dB(A). The source noise level shall be measured as a LAeq 15 minute; and
  - c) not discharge any condensate or moisture onto the ground surface of the premises or into stormwater drainage system in contravention of the requirements of the *Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997*.

## 7.0 - Prior to Issue of a Subdivision Certificate

The following conditions of consent shall be complied with prior to the issue of a Subdivision Certificate.

- (1) **Requirement for a Subdivision Certificate** - The application for subdivision certificate(s) shall be made in accordance with the requirements of Clause 157 of the Environmental Planning & Assessment Regulation 2000.
- (2) **Show Easements/ Restrictions On The Plan Of Subdivision** - The developer shall acknowledge all existing easements and/or restrictions on the use of the land on the final plan of subdivision.
- (3) **Services** - Certificates and/or relevant documents shall be obtained from the following service providers and provided to the PCA:
- a) Energy supplier – Evidence demonstrating that satisfactory arrangements have been made with the energy supplier to service the proposed development;
  - b) Telecommunications – Evidence demonstrating that satisfactory arrangements have been made with a telecommunications carrier to service the proposed development; and



- 
- c) Water supplier – Evidence demonstrating that satisfactory arrangements have been made with a water supply provider to service the proposed development.
  - (4) **Occupation Certificate required** – Prior to the issue of a Subdivision Certificate associated with this development consent 16/2016, an Occupation Certificate for the dwellings shall be issued by the PCA. Documentary evidence of the issue of the occupation certificate shall be provided to Council in conjunction with the application for the subdivision certificate.

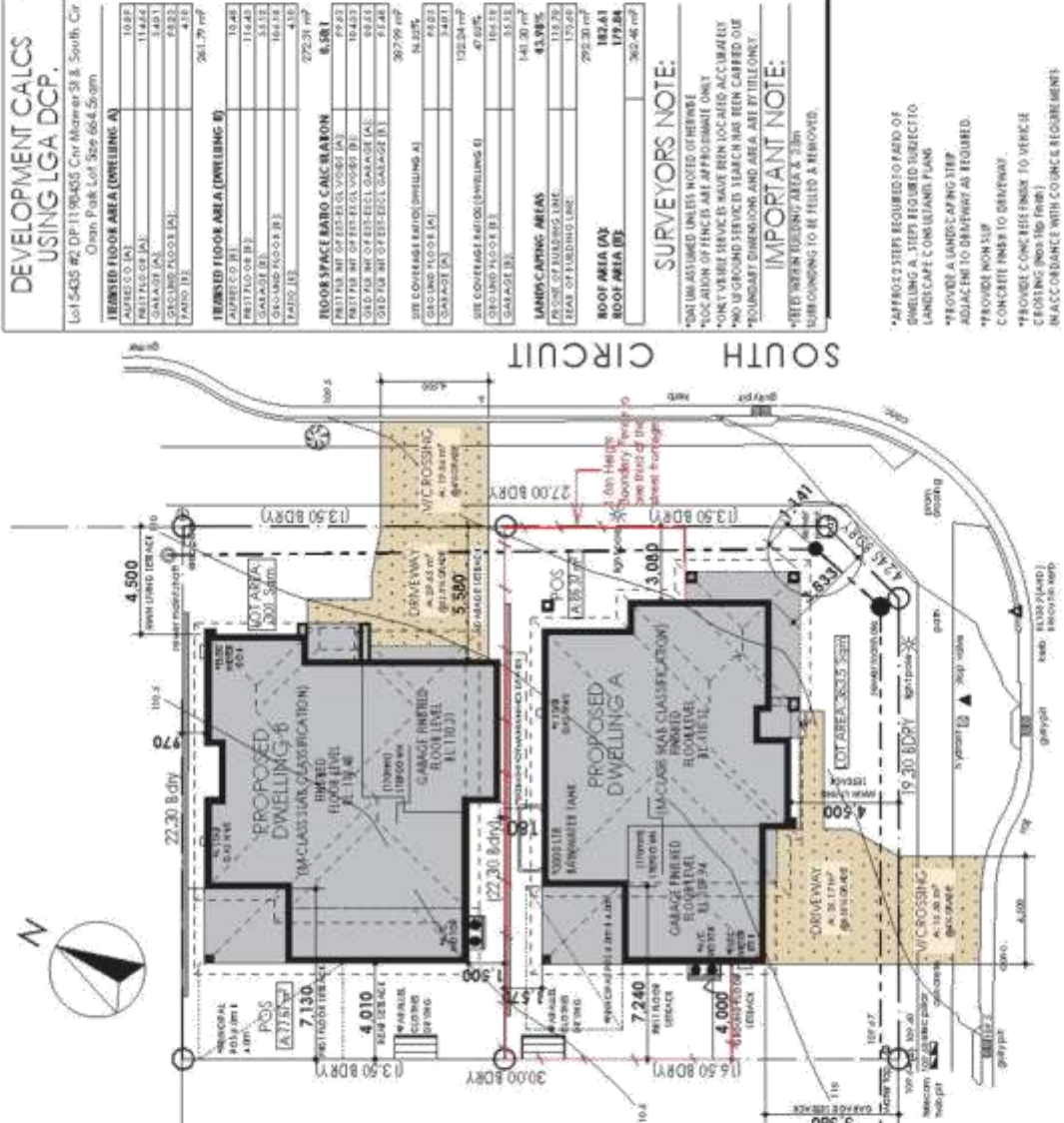

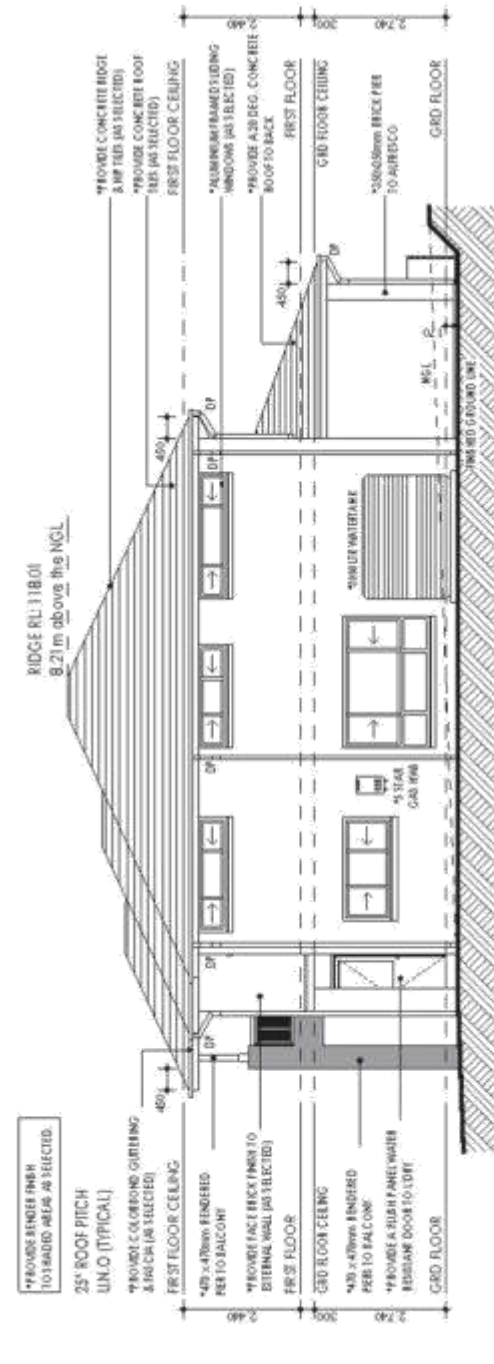

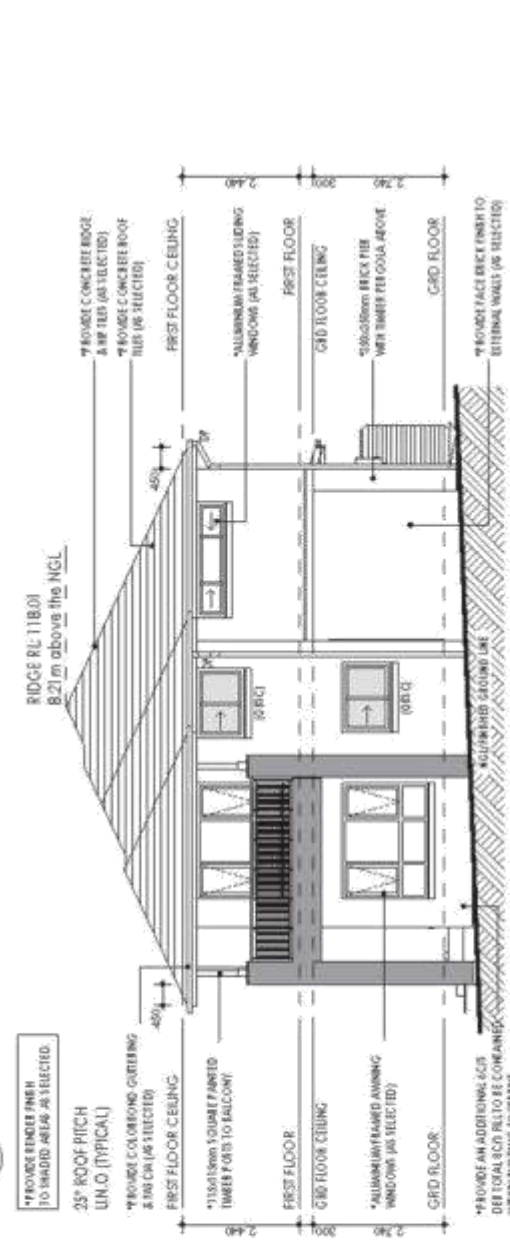

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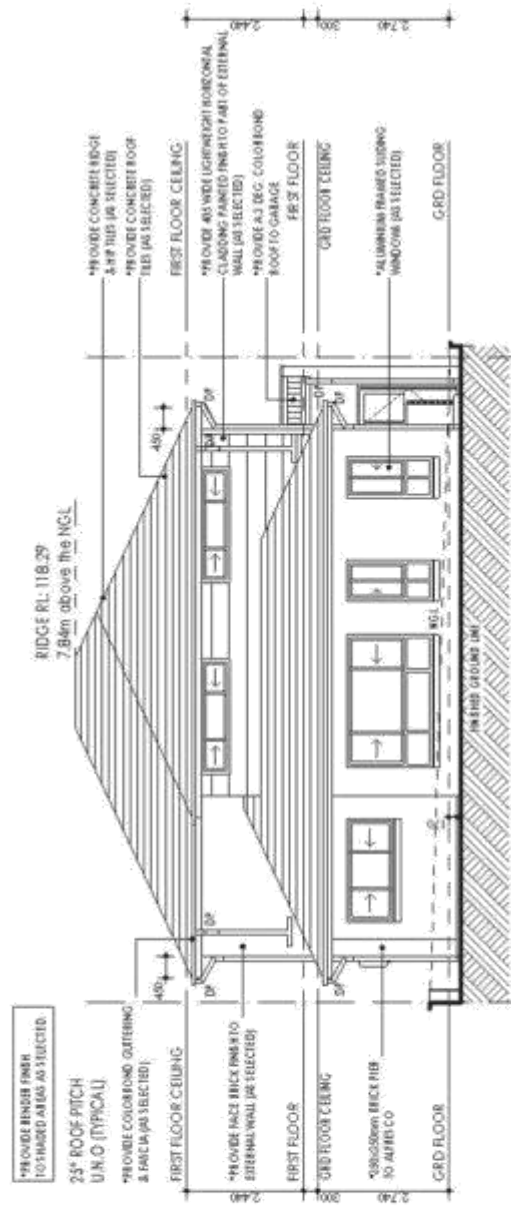

In 1949 they fled the devastation left by World War II, and moved to Australia. In 1967, Altraas merged with Thomas Nationwide Transport, and the combined company became TNT Ltd. Under Abeles' guidance as managing director, TNT quickly expanded, and by the 1980s had established a presence in 180 countries and was termed "the second biggest transport empire in the world, operating by road, rail, sea and air". Abeles was knighted in 1972 for services to business and the arts, on the recommendation of the New South Wales government led by Sir Robert Askin. He was appointed a Companion of the Order of Australia in 1991 and was named "Australian of the Year" in <i>The Australian</i> in 1987. |    |

Here he worked with and was influenced by René Dubos, who is one of the claimed originators of the phrase "Think Globally, Act Locally".</p>   |    |
| 9  | Beaumont Road | Admiral Alan Lee Beaumont AC RAN       | <p>(24 December 1934 – 23 September 2004) was a senior officer within the Royal Australian Navy, eventually serving as Chief of the Australian Defence Force from 1993 until 1995. Beaumont joined the Royal Australian Naval College in 1948, graduating in 1951. He trained with the Royal Navy and Royal Australian Navy before being promoted to Lieutenant in 1956. He completed a Torpedo Anti-Submarine specialist course with the Royal Navy between 1959 and 1960, and later served periods of exchange service with the Royal Navy and United States Navy as a specialist in the field. As a Lieutenant Commander, Beaumont served as Executive Officer on HMAS Brisbane during a seven-month Vietnam War tour in 1969. He was promoted to Commander for his service in this position, and posted as Officer-in-Charge HMAS Watson. Beaumont commanded HMAS Ibis in 1962, HMAS Yarra between 1962 and 1973, and HMAS Vampire between 1975 and 1979. Staff postings in Canberra followed, including Director of Underwater Weapons, Follow-on Destroyer Project Officer, Director of Naval Plans, Director General Naval Plans and Policy and President of Officers Selection Boards. For his service as Director of Naval Plans, Beaumont was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in the Australia Day Honours list of 1982. Beaumont was appointed Chief of Staff to the Flag Officer Naval Support Command in January 1987, later being promoted to rear admiral in June and assuming the duties of Assistant Chief of Naval Staff (Development). He was appointed to the post of Assistant Chief of the Defence Force (Personnel) on 5 December 1988, and appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) in the 1989 Queen's Birthday Honours list. Promoted to vice admiral on 11 September 1989, Beaumont assumed the appointment of Vice Chief of the Defence Force, serving in this position until October 1992. | 22 | Comforth Crescent | Sir John Warcup Kappa Comforth, Jr., AC, CBE, FRSc, FAA     | (7 September 1917 – 8 December 2013), was an Australian-British chemist who won the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1975 for his work on the stereochemistry of enzyme-catalysed reactions. Comforth investigated enzymes that catalyse changes in organic compounds, the substrates, by taking the place of hydrogen atoms in a substrate's chains and rings. In his syntheses and descriptions of the structure of various terpenes, olefins, and steroids, Comforth determined specifically which cluster of hydrogen atoms in a substrate were replaced by an enzyme to effect a given change in the substrate, allowing him to detail the biosynthesis of cholesterol. For this work, he won a share of the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1975, alongside co-recipient Vladimir Prelog, and was knighted in 1977.  |    |

For his work in combating malaria in Papua New Guinea he was made a Member of the Order of the British Empire in 1945. In 1938, uneasy about the rise of Adolf Hitler, he legally changed his middle name to John. Following his war-time service he was recruited by Frank Macfarlane Burnet to work at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research in Melbourne. Initially they worked on smallpox in mice, mousepox, for which he coined the term 'mousepox' and later on poxvirus genetics.  |    |

In 1999 she was awarded the Companion of the Order of Australia for her services to the community and for 'coordination of world-wide efforts to develop and research educational strategies to reduce sudden infant death in infancy'. She was responsible for the development of a direct referral system involving the Foundation, the Health Department, State Coroner's office, Ambulance Service and hospitals. In 1988, Fitzgerald established Red Nose Day as a fundraising activity and convinced other state based SIDS bodies to join the fundraising activity. It became a signature national fundraising 'day' in Australia. Internationally, Fitzgerald co-founded SIDS International and was the inaugural executive and then chairman of the group from 1989 - 1992. She then developed a network of research coordination - the Global Strategy Task Force. In 1991 Fitzgerald was approached to help establish the Monash Research Foundation for Reproduction and Development. This group became the Ritchie Centre. Fitzgerald's commitment to research was honored with the Ritchie Centre's annual Kaarene Fitzgerald public forum. Fitzgerald was born in Te Kuiti, New Zealand and died in Melbourne, Australia on May 24, 2005, after a long battle with cancer. She had four children - Karl, Anita, Lacey & Michael. |    |

Promoted to general after two years in this role, he was appointed Chairman, Chiefs of Staff Committee, which was reorganised as Chief of the Defence Force Staff the following year. | 41 | Heinze Street | Sr Bernard Thomas Heinze, AC                                     | (1 July 1884 – 10 June 1982) was an Australian conductor, academic, and Director of the New South Wales State Conservatorium of Music. He conducted all the orchestras run by the ABC, most particularly the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, of which he was chief conductor from 1933 to 1950. Also, he was chief conductor of the Royal Melbourne Philharmonic from 1927, becoming Honorary Life Conductor in the 1960s, and continuing his association with the RMP until 1978. The case was argued through the Supreme Court of New South Wales, the High Court and then finally to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. As a lawyer, Kitto often argued both alongside and against Garfield Barwick, then a King's Counsel and later Chief Justice of Australia. In the banks nationalisation case, Kitto and Barwick argued for the banks, in another case which went to the Privy Council. Kitto's work in defeating the Chifley government's attempt to nationalise the banks was rewarded by the opposing Menzies government two years later by an appointment to the bench of the High Court on 10 May 1950. Kitto was the first person appointed to the Court who had been born after Federation. At his swearing in, Kitto remarked: "[Australia's] future will be influenced in no small degree by the quality of the work we do in upholding the rule of law and proving its worth and effectiveness in the development of a nation in whose righteousness must lie its greatness." |    |

Law's wife, Nel, a secondary school teacher, professional artist and writer, was the first Australian woman to visit Antarctica. Nel died in 1990. He resigned as Premier, and from Parliament, on 1 December 1977. After his terms as premier, Neilson accepted the position as Agent General for Tasmania in London. 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| 69 | Sidney Nolan    | Sir Sidney Nolan OM, AC               | <p>(22 April 1917 – 28 November 1992) was one of Australia's best-known painters and printmakers. Nolan painted a wide range of personal interpretations of historical and legendary figures, including explorers Burke and Willk, and Eliza Fraser. With time his paintings of Miss Fraser came to be associated with his growing animus towards Sunday Reed. However when first painted on Fraser Island in 1947 after he had left Heide, he remained on friendly terms with the Reeds and sent them photos of the works for their approval. Indeed he gave one Fraser Island painting to Sunday Reed as a Christmas gift that year.</p> <p>Probably his most famous work is a series of stylised descriptions of the bushranger Ned Kelly in the Australian Outback. Nolan left the famous 1946-47 series of 27 Ned Kellys at "Heide", when he left it in emotionally charged circumstances. He adopted the alias Robin Murray, a name suggested by Sunday Reed, whose affectionate nickname for him was "Robin Redbreast". Although he once wrote to Sunday Reed to tell her to take what she wanted, he subsequently demanded all his works back. Sunday Reed returned 284 other paintings and drawings to Nolan, but she refused to give up the 25 remaining Kellys, partly because she saw the works as fundamental to the proposed Heide Museum of Modern Art. Possibly also because she collaborated with Nolan on the paintings. Eventually, she gave them to the National Gallery of Australia in 1977 and this resolved the dispute. Nolan's Ned Kelly series follow the main sequence of the Kelly story. However Nolan did not intend the series to be an authentic depiction of these events. Rather, these episodes/series became the setting for the artist's meditations upon universal themes of injustice, love and betrayal. The Kelly saga was also a way for Nolan to paint the Australian landscape in new ways, with the story giving meaning to the place.</p>  |    |

| 71 | Elephant Street | Sir Mark Oliphant, AC, KBE, FRSE, FAA | <p>Sir Marcus "Mark" Laurence Elwin Oliphant, AC KBE FRSE FAA (8 October 1901 – 14 July 2000) was an Australian physicist and humanitarian who played an important role in the first experimental demonstration of nuclear fusion and also the development of nuclear weapons.</p> <p>Born in Adelaide, South Australia, Oliphant graduated from the University of Adelaide in 1923. He was awarded an 1851 Exhibition Scholarship in 1927 on the strength of the research he had done on mercury, and went to England, where he studied under Sir Ernest Rutherford at the University of Cambridge's Cavendish Laboratory. There, he used a particle accelerator to fire heavy hydrogen nuclei (deuterons) at various targets. He discovered the nuclei of helium-3 (helions) and tritium (tritons). He also discovered that when they reacted with each other, the particles that were released had far more energy than they started with. Energy had been liberated from inside the nucleus, and he realised that this was a result of nuclear fusion.</p> <p>Oliphant left the Cavendish Laboratory in 1937 to become the Poynting Professor of Physics at the University of Birmingham. He attempted to build a 60-inch (150 cm) cyclotron at the university, but its completion was postponed by the outbreak of the Second World War in Europe in 1939. He became involved with the development of radar, heading a group at the University of Birmingham that included John Randall and Harry Boot, who created a radical new design, the cavity magnetron, that made microwave radar possible. He also formed part of the MAUD Committee, which reported that an atomic bomb was not only feasible, but might be produced as early as 1943. Oliphant was instrumental in spreading the word of this finding in the United States, thereby starting what became the Manhattan Project. Later in the war, he worked on it with his friend Ernest Lawrence at the Radiation Laboratory in Berkeley, California, on electromagnetic isotope separation. After the war, Oliphant returned to Australia as the first Director of the Research School of Physical Sciences and Engineering at the new Australian National University, where he initiated the design and construction of the world's largest (500 megajoule) homopolar generator. He retired in 1976, but was appointed Governor of South Australia on the advice of Premier Don Dunstan. He assisted in the founding of the Australian Democrats political party, and he was the chairman of the meeting in Melbourne in 1977 at which the party was launched. Late in life he watched his wife, Rosa, suffer before her death in 1987, and he became an advocate for voluntary euthanasia. He died in Canberra in 2000.</p> |   |

| 81 | Rowland Avenue           | Air Marshal Sir James Rowland, AC, CBE, DFC, AFC | Air Marshal Sir James Anthony (Jim) Rowland (3 November 1922 – 27 May 1999) was a senior commander in the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF), serving as Chief of the Air Staff (CAS) from 1975 to 1979. He later held office as Governor of New South Wales from 1981 to 1989, and was Chancellor of the University of Sydney from 1990 to 1991. Born in rural New South Wales, Rowland cut short his aeronautical engineering studies at the University of Sydney to join the RAAF in 1942. He was posted to Britain and served as a bomber pilot with the Pathfinders in the air war over Europe, earning the Distinguished Flying Cross in 1944. After repatriation and demobilisation, Rowland gained his engineering degree and rejoined the RAAF. He became a test pilot, serving with and later commanding the Aircraft Research and Development Unit in the 1950s, and also a senior engineering officer, being closely involved in preparations for delivery to Australia of the Dassault Mirage III supersonic fighter in the 1960s. In 1972 he was promoted to air vice marshal and became Air Member for Technical Services, holding this post until his elevation to air marshal and appointment as CAS in March 1975. He was the first engineering officer to lead the RAAF, and the first man to personally command it in a legal sense, following abolition of the Australian Air Board in 1976. Knighted in 1977, Rowland retired from the Air Force in 1979 and became Governor of New South Wales in January 1981. He was appointed a Companion of the Order of Australia in 1987. Retiring from the Governorship in 1989, he held a place on several boards as well as the Chairmanship of the University of Sydney. He died in 1999. |  |

In 1967, he left the CSIRO and became a Professor of Biology at the Australian National University in Canberra. [4] While at ANU, Slatyer travelled twice to the United States where he worked as a Visiting Professor at Duke University (1963–64) and the University of California (1973–74). In the United States, he was appointed a Senior Fellow of both the National Science Foundation and the Ford Foundation. In March 1975 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society. In 1977, Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser offered the position of Australia's Ambassador to UNESCO to Dr. Slatyer. Fraser had originally offered the post to Sir John Kerr, who as Governor-General had been responsible for the dismissal of Gough Whitlam's government in the 1975 Australian constitutional crisis, but considerable public pressure prompted Fraser to withdraw the offer to Kerr, and offer the post to Slatyer instead. Slatyer returned to Australia in 1982, after four years in Paris, and resumed his professorship at ANU. Later that year, the Fraser government appointed him the chair of the Australian Science and Technology Council (ASTEC), a body set up in 1978 by Fraser as a government "think tank" on science and technology. In Slatyer's five years as chair, ASTEC was instrumental in lobbying for tax concessions for research and development in Australia, and conducting a review of the CSIRO. In 1988, Slatyer was made the first Chief Scientist of Australia, advising the Prime Minister of the day on matters relating to science and technology. He was also largely responsible during his tenure for the establishment of Cooperative Research Centres in Australia, a program designed to facilitate collaboration between business and researchers. |  |

The success of Victor's meat importing business saw the entire family become involved in the company, and soon Smorgon Consolidated Industries expanded its business to cover plastics, glass, steel and recycling. By 1995, the collective worth of Smorgon Consolidated Industries' interests in steel, paper, plastics, packaging and property had been estimated at between A\$1.2 billion and \$1.5 billion. In February of that year, the Smorgon family decided to divest the company (with the exception of the Smorgon Steel Group, Australia's second-largest steel producer, which was floated publicly). The proceeds of the SCI sale were distributed among the seven branches of the Smorgon family in Australia, and re-invested or used to purchase new holdings under the umbrella of the Victor Smorgon Group. In the 1950s and 1960s he made discoveries based on radio observations of the Sun. In the late 1960s and early 1970s his team built and operated the world's first solar radio-spectrographs and subsequently the Culgoora radio-heliograph, near Narrabri, New South Wales. The Paul Wild Observatory at Culgoora is named after him. In 1972 Paul Wild invented Interscan, a standard microwave landing system. From 1978 to 1985 he was chairman of the CSIRO, during which time he expanded the organisation's scope and directed its restructuring. 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| 106 | Winneke Way   | Sir Henry Arthur Winneke AC, KCMG, KCVO, DBE, KStJ, QC | <p>(20 October 1906 – 28 December 1985) was a Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Victoria and Governor of Victoria. Following the outbreak of the Second World War, he was commissioned in the Royal Australian Air Force in October 1939. He was subsequently promoted to Wing Commander on 1 October 1941 and to Group Captain a month later, when he was appointed Director of Personnel Services. He was appointed O.B.E. (Militia) in 1944. Following the end of the Second World War, Winneke left the RAAF returned to practice at the Victorian Bar. He developed a large general practice, and was described by Sir John Young (his successor as Chief Justice) as "a very sound lawyer with a clear and penetrating mind", and a "clear and powerful advocate". He was appointed a Kings Counsel in 1949. Winneke became Solicitor-General for the State of Victoria in 1951. In that capacity, he regularly prosecuted in important Criminal trials, and also appeared for the State of Victoria in Constitutional cases in the High Court of Australia and the Privy Council. While Solicitor General, he provided robust advice to the Victorian Government and refused to be swayed by political considerations. This included advising the then Victorian Premier Sir Henry Bolte and Chief Secretary Sir Arthur Rylah that they might be guilty of intentional unlawful homicide, or murder, if the Government hanged a convicted murderer named Robert Peter Tait notwithstanding a temporary stay on his execution granted by the High Court of Australia (see Tait v R (1962) 108 CLR 620). Winneke was appointed as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Victoria in 1964. According to Sir John Young, he was "a model of fairness", who delivered judgments which "were models of clarity and learning". He was appointed Lieutenant Governor of Victoria in 1972. In 1974, he retired from office as Chief Justice and became the Governor of Victoria, an office which he occupied with "great distinction" until 1982. He was knighted in 1957, created KCMG in 1966, KCVO in 1977 and AC in 1982. He received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Melbourne in 1978 and Monash University in 1980. Dox Chipp said that Winneke had told him in 1971 that the convicted murderer Leih Ratten was innocent. In 1981, when Ratten had yet to be released, Chipp said Winneke denied the conversation had taken place. Later a member of the Supreme Court at the time of Ratten's trial told Tom Malorny that Winneke had wanted to remove the jury from the trial. | 107 | Carl Wood     | Edwin Carlyle "Carl" Wood, AC, CBE, FRCS, FRANZCOG     | <p>(28 May 1929 – 23 September 2011) was a prominent Australian gynaecologist, best known for his pioneering work developing and commercialising the technique of in-vitro fertilisation (IVF). He gained considerable international and national attention for his wide-ranging contributions in the field of women's health over a period of almost 50 years, although not all of it was positive given the controversial nature of many of his endeavours.</p>  |  |
| 108 | Woodward Lane | Edward Woodward  | <p>(6 August 1928 – 15 April 2010) was an Australian jurist. Edward Woodward was born in Ballarat in 1928 to Eric Woodward (later as Lieutenant General Sir Eric Woodward, a Governor of New South Wales) and Amy Freame Wellier. After completing both his primary and secondary education at Melbourne Grammar School, Woodward continued his studies at the University of Melbourne, where he graduated with a Master of Laws. He was admitted to the Bar in 1951 and was appointed a Queen's Counsel in 1965. During his career, he sat on several boards and 17 Royal Commissions, of four of which he was the Chairman. The most famous of these was the Aboriginal Land Rights Commission in 1973–74. He was President of the Trade Practices Tribunal 1974–76 and a Justice of the Federal Court of Australia 1977–90. As Director-General of Security between 1976 and 1981, he headed the Australian Security Intelligence Organisation. He was a member of Camberwell Grammar School Council between 1972 and 1987 and Chairman in 1987. He was made a Life Governor of the school in 2002. In 1990 he succeeded Sir Roy Douglas Wright as Chancellor of his alma mater, the University of Melbourne, a post he held until 2001. He died on 15 April 2010, aged 81.</p>   | No image  |
| 109 | John Young    | Sir John McIntosh Young AC KCMG                        | <p>(17 December 1919 – 6 October 2008) was an Australian jurist. He was the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Victoria 1974–91, the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria 1974–95, and the Chief Scout of Australia 1989–96. John Young was born in Melbourne to Scottish immigrant parents. He went to Geelong Grammar School, and then to Oxford. On the day after World War II broke out in September 1939 he joined the Horse Cavalry, then after officer training at Sandhurst he asked to be transferred to the Scots Guards (1940-1946). He was mentioned in despatches after heavy fighting in Germany. He was the officer in charge of Rudolf Hess's guards when Hess tried to escape in 1941 at Camp Z in Surrey. On return to Australia, he did a law degree at the University of Melbourne, and was admitted to the Victorian Bar in 1948. He was chairman of the Victorian Police Board, president of the Victorian Law Foundation, and president of the Victorian Bar. He became Chief Justice of Victoria in 1974, and was also appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria that year. As Chief Justice, he was not afraid to speak out against the government of the day. He had a long association with the Scouting movement, and he accepted the role of Chief Scout of Australia in 1989, when the newly appointed Governor-General Bill Hayden declined it on the grounds that the Scout Oath was incompatible with his atheism. In 1996–97 he was National President of Scouts Australia. Sir John Young died on 6 October 2008, survived by two daughters and a son, and their families. 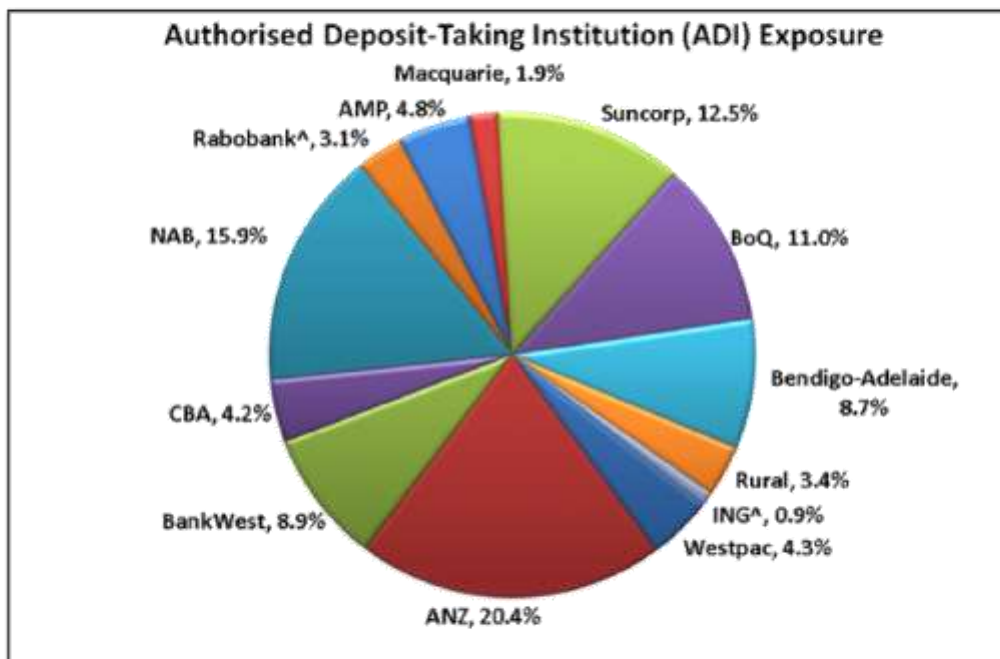

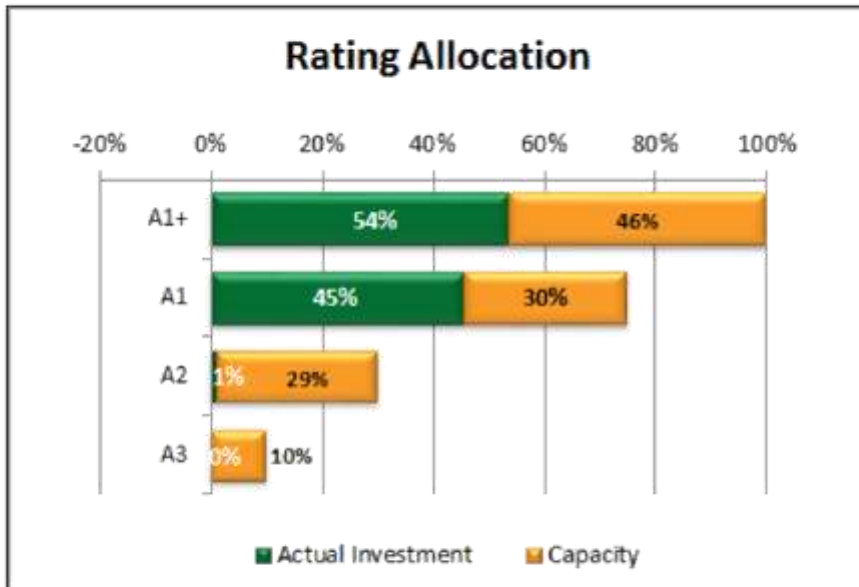

The investment portfolio is predominately directed to the higher rated entities led by ANZ and NAB.



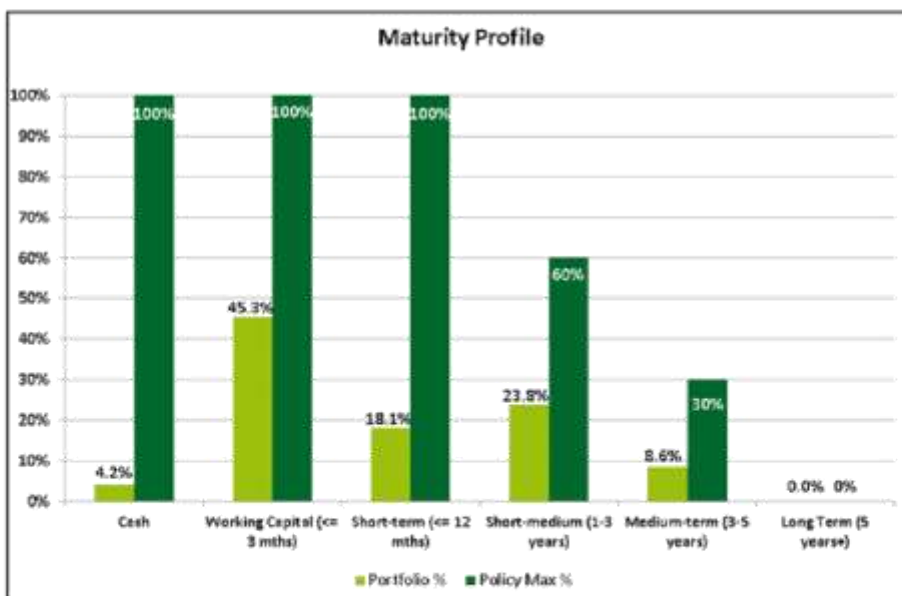
## Credit Quality

A1+ (the domestic majors) and A1 (the higher rated regionals) rated ADIs are the largest share of Council's investments. There is still capacity to invest across the entire credit spectrum.



## Term to Maturity

The portfolio remains adequately liquid with approximately 4.2% of investments at-call and another 45.3% of assets maturing within 3 months. There is still capacity to invest in terms greater than 1 year. In consultation with its investment advisors, Council has strategically diversified its investments across various maturities up to 5 years over recent years.



In the historic low interest rate environment, as existing deposits mature, they will generally be reinvested at much lower rates than preceding years. A larger spread of maturities in medium-term assets would help income pressures over future financial years. This is becoming increasingly difficult with the RBA's pair of rate cuts in 2015, coupled with deposit margins contracting amongst the higher rated institutions. The futures market continues to factor in another rate cut by the end of 2016.

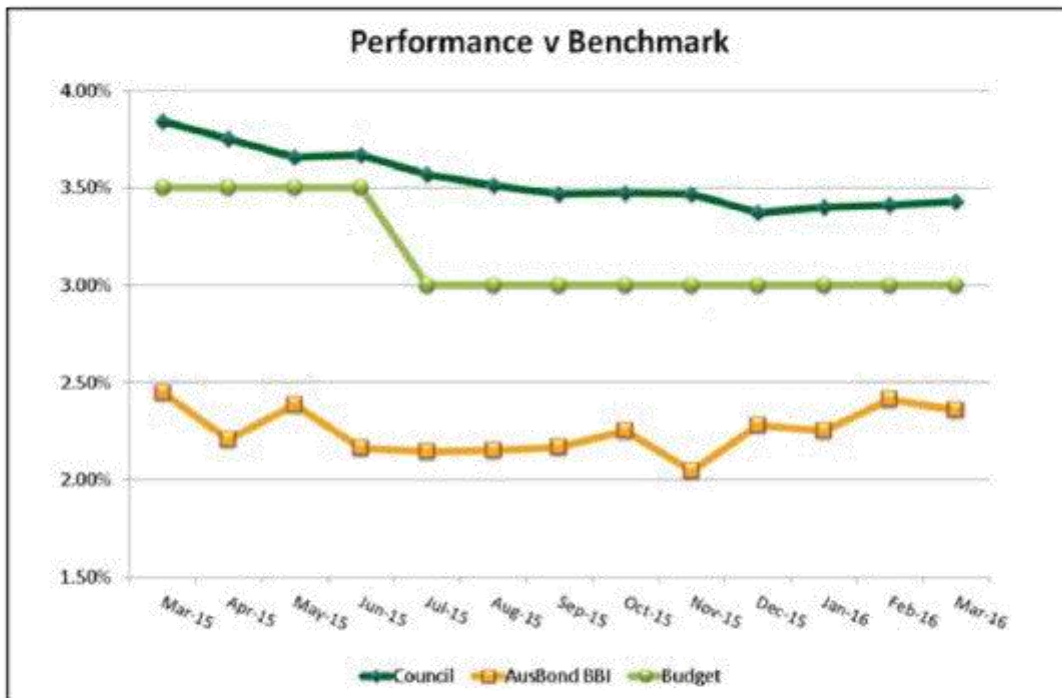

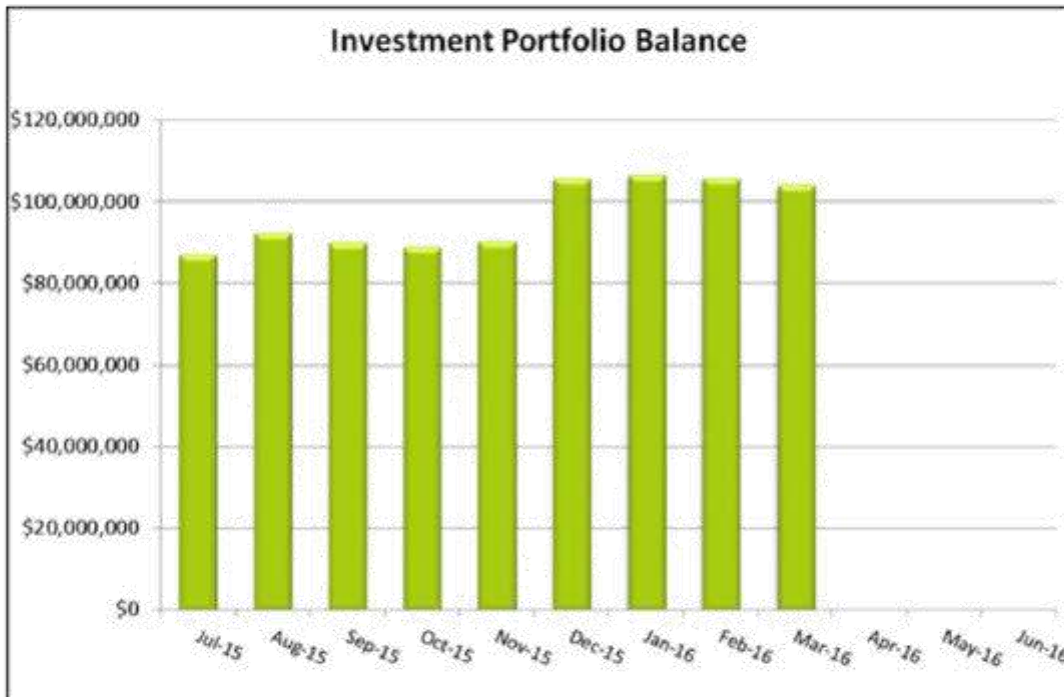


The portfolio's outperformance over the benchmark (AusBond Bank Bill Index) continues to be attributed to the longer-dated deposits in the portfolio. Deposits invested close to or above 4% will contribute strongly to outperformance over coming financial years. As existing deposits mature, performance will generally fall as deposits will be reinvested at much lower prevailing rates compared to previous years. Future budgets may be adjusted to reflect a longer period of low interest rates.

## Appendix B – Ratings Definitions

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### Standard & Poor's Ratings Description

Standard & Poor's (S&P) is a professional organisation that provides analytical services. An S&P rating is an opinion of the general credit worthiness of an obligor with respect to particular debt security or other financial obligation – based on relevant risk factors.

Credit ratings are based, in varying degrees, on the following considerations:

- Likelihood of payment
- Nature and provisions of the obligation
- Protection afforded by, and relative position of, the obligation in the event of bankruptcy, reorganisation or other laws affecting creditors' rights
- The issue rating definitions are expressed in terms of default risk.

### S&P Short-Term Obligation Ratings are:

- **A-1:** This is the highest short-term category used by S&P. The obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on the obligation is strong. Within this category, certain obligations are designated with a plus sign (+). This indicates that the obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on these obligations is extremely strong.
- **A-2:** A short-term obligation rated A-2 is somewhat more susceptible to the adverse changes in circumstances and economic conditions than obligations in higher rating categories. However the obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on the obligation is satisfactory.
- **A-3:** A short-term obligation rated A-3 exhibits adequate protection parameters. However, adverse economic conditions or changing circumstances are more likely to lead to a weakened capacity of the obligor to meet its financial commitment on the obligation.



**S&P Long-Term Obligations Ratings are:**

- **AAA:** An obligation/obligor rated AAA has the highest rating assigned by S&P. The obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on the obligation is extremely strong.
- **AA:** An obligation/obligor rated AA differs from the highest rated obligations only in small degree. The obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on the obligations is very strong.
- **A:** An obligation/obligor rated A is somewhat more susceptible to the adverse effects of changes in circumstances and economic conditions than obligations/obligors in higher rated categories. However the obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on the obligation is strong.
- **BBB:** A short-term obligation rated BBB exhibits adequate protection parameters. However, adverse economic conditions or changing circumstances are more likely to lead to a weakened capacity of the obligor to meet its financial commitment on the obligation.
- **Unrated:** Financial Institutions do not necessarily require a credit rating from the various ratings agencies such as Standard & Poor's and these institutions are classed as "Unrated". Most Credit Unions and Building societies fall into this category. These institutions nonetheless must adhere to the capital maintenance requirements of the Australian Prudential Regulatory Authority (APRA) in line with all authorised Deposit Taking Institutions (Banks, Building societies and Credit Unions).
- **Plus (+) or Minus(-):** The ratings from "AA" to "BBB" may be modified by the addition of a plus or minus sign to show relative standing within the major rating categories

Fitch and Moody's have similar classifications.

## Appendix C – Recently Invested ADIs

### Rural Bank

Historically, the Bank was formed as Elders Rural Bank and received its banking licence in 2000. In August 2009, Elders Rural Bank Limited changed its name to Rural Bank Limited and, in December 2010, Rural Bank became a fully-owned subsidiary of the Bendigo and Adelaide Bank Group.

In December 2010, Bendigo and Adelaide Bank announced that it would increase its shareholding in Rural Bank from 60% to 100% for \$165m, or approximately 1.2 times book value. As such, Rural Bank takes on its parent's company's long-term credit rating of A- by S&P.

Over the years, the bank's business model has expanded, but its core business has not changed. They specialise in lending to the agricultural sector in rural and regional centres across the country. Rural Bank's products and services are now available at more than 400 locations nationally.

#### *Financial Results*

As at 30 September 2015, Bendigo-Adelaide Bank's Tier 1 Capital Ratio stood at 10.48% and its Total Capital Ratio at 12.46%, well above Basel III minimum capital requirements.

At a group level, Bendigo-Adelaide Bank Ltd announced a statutory profit after tax of \$191.6 million for the 6 months ending 30 June 2014, an 6.0% decrease on the prior corresponding period. The cash earnings result is \$196.4 million for the 6 months ending 30 June 2014, a 5.7% increase on the prior corresponding period. Retail deposits stood at \$44.84 billion (up from \$42.65 billion in December 2013), an increase of 5.0%.

### Rabobank Australia

With over 110 years of history, the Rabobank Group is a leading provider of financial services around the world and has a strong historical presence for the global food and agriculture industry. Headquartered in Utrecht, the Netherlands, Rabobank is a cooperative bank with over AUD\$926.4 billion in assets (€732 billion)<sup>1</sup>, approximately 10 million clients, more than 59,000 employees, and a presence in 48 countries. Rabobank is one of the 30 largest financial institutions in the world based on Tier 1 Capital.

Rabobank established an office in Australia in 1990 and acquired the Primary Industry Bank of Australia (PIBA) operating in Australia and New Zealand in 1994. With headquarters in Sydney, Rabobank has 61 branches throughout Australia and 32 branches in New Zealand. As at December 2011, the Group employed more than 1,000 people in Australia and New Zealand, with more than half based in regional locations.

In early November 2014, ratings agency Standard & Poor's downgraded the Dutch Rabobank group, and therefore Australia's long-term credit rating from AA- to A+ (short-term rating from A-1+ to A-1). Rabobank Australia itself remains financially solid with a Tier 1 Capital of 11.27% and Total Capital Ratio of 12.99% as at September 2015.

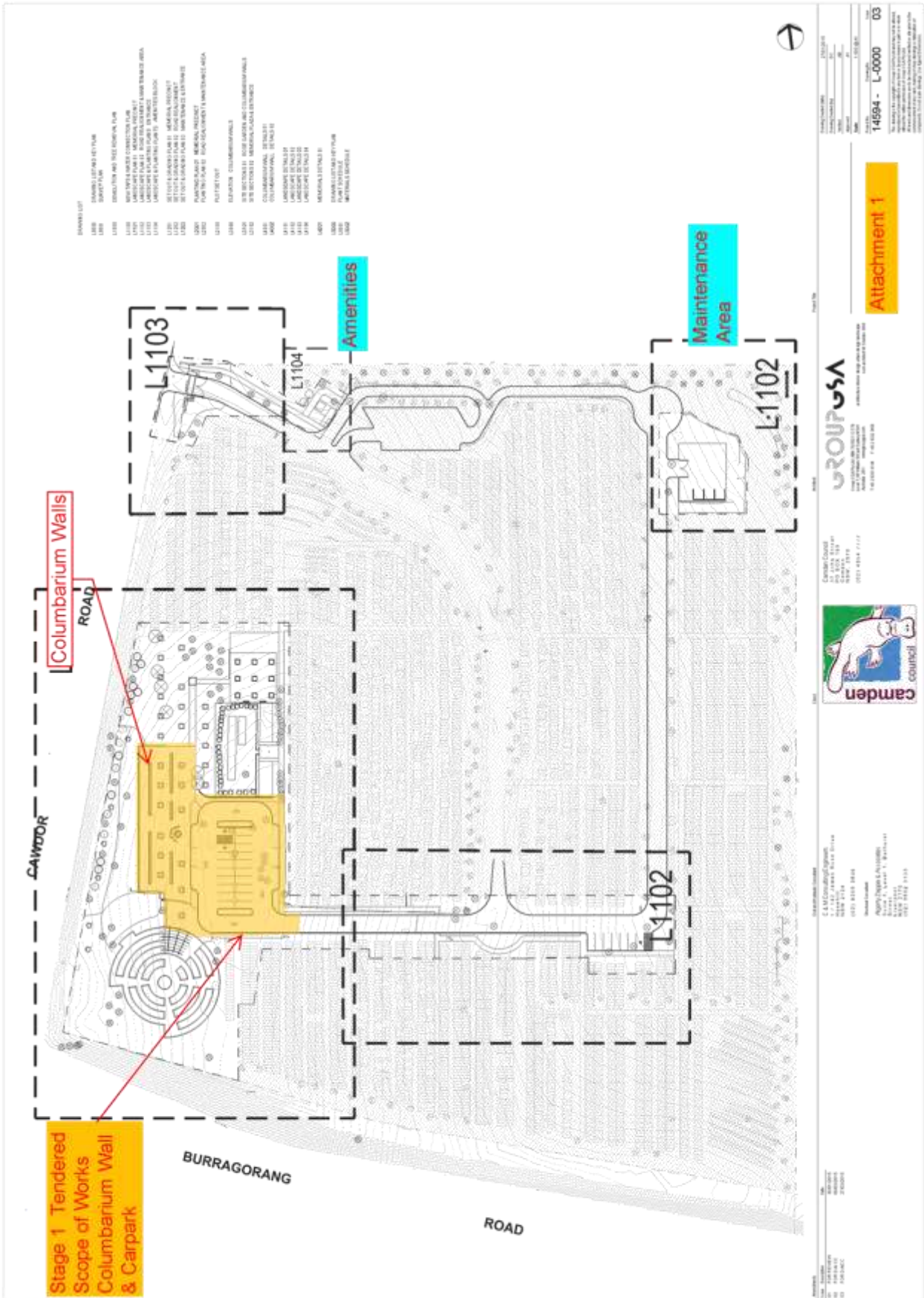

From May 2015, new Rabobank Australia deposits will not be guaranteed by the global group, but existing deposits will have their guarantee grandfathered.

**BankWest**

Bankwest is an ADI based in Perth, Western Australia. Formerly a wholly owned subsidiary of HBOS plc but was sold in October 2008 to the Commonwealth Bank of Australia (CBA) for \$2.1 billion. BankWest continues to operate independently of its parent company but has the same long-term credit rating of CBA, being "AA-" by ratings agency S&P.

At a group level, as at 30/09/2015, CBA had a Tier 1 Capital of 11.8% and Total Capital Ratio of 13.3%.
